THE TEN COMMANDMENTS FOR NAMES

- 1. Thou shalt name your male children: Albert, James, John, Joseph, Josiah, Richard, Thomas, William.
- 2. Thou shalt name your female children: Elizabeth, Mary, Martha, Maria, Sarah.
- 3. Thou shalt leave NO trace of your female children.
- 4. Thou shalt, after naming your children from the above lists, call them by strange nicknames such as: Polly, Dolly, Sukey.
- 5. Thou shalt NOT use any middle names on any legal documents or census reports and only when necessary, you may use only initials on legal documents.
- 6. Thou shalt learn to sign all documents illegibly so that your surname can be spelled, or misspelled, in various ways: Hicks, Hickes, Hix, Hicke, Hucks, Kicks.
- 7. Thou shalt leave NO cemetery records or headstones with legible names.
- 8. Thou shalt leave No family Bible with records of births, marriages, or deaths.
- 9. Thou shalt ALWAYS flip thy name around. If born James Albert, thou must make all the rest of thy records in the names of Albert, AJ, JA, AL, Bert, Bart or Alfred.
- 10. Thou shalt also flip thy parent's names when making reference to them, although "Unknown" or a blank line is an acceptable alternative.

Military Records Tip

Cannot find your ancestor's military information and you know he was eligible for military duty in the Civil War? Yet you cannot find any information about him on any muster rolls and there is no indication of where any records for this ancestor may be. Remember, many men were rejected from Civil War service because of illness or injury. Medical records of drafted and rejected men are at the National Archives, group records #110. They are arranged by Congressional District as of 1963. Data may include residence, occupation, age, place of birth, physical characteristics or reasons for rejection.


