Research Trips - Family Reunions

Summer time is a time for family reunions and research trips. Both can bring forth valuable information concerning the families we are researching if preparation is done ahead.

Before attending a reunion or going on a research trip, go over your information. Set some goals - define just what information you hope to find to supplement what you already have. Make a list of questions you want to find the answers. If your goal is to visit the family cemetery to take pictures of family headstones, make sure you have plenty of film and new camera batteries. Also take along a small notepad and pencil/pen so you can copy down the information on the headstones. Have large pieces of paper and some chalk/crayon with you. That way you are not scrambling for a large enough piece of paper to place over the headstone and/or utensil (chalk/crayon) to complete the etching (rubbing) of the headstone. Be sure to document each piece of information as you obtain it to save you time when you get back home and try to remember where you took this picture or obtained that piece of information. Did Aunt Liddy say that or was it cousin Sue? Was it the museum I found this document or the courthouse? What was the page and book number?

While you are compiling the list of questions you hope to find the answers to on your research trip or family reunion, make a list of the places to visit or people to talk to. What do you hope to find at each location? What type of information do I hope to learn from what relative at the reunion?

Take the time to complete a timeline or brief record for the family/families on which you hope to gather information. That way you will have something to help refresh your mind when needed as just to what you are seeking or what you already have on hand.

Perhaps you have some unidentified pictures. If you are attending a family reunion and you think the pictures are from that family, you can prepare a poster board with copies of the original pictures. It can be placed somewhere at the reunion for people to look at and perhaps you will find the identities of the mysterious people in the pictures. You may also learn how they fit in your family. You could number each picture and have a small notebook for people to write down who they think the identities of the persons or places in the pictures are.

If you are going to be visiting a place where others are also researching the same family line, perhaps you may want to leave your name and address for them to contact you. Perhaps you will meet someone also researching your family line. Some esearchers have address cards the size of a business card. On the back of the card they have placed basic information of the line they are researching or a small pedigree chart. Someone else visiting the same location can then contact them with +questions or helpful information to help further your research. If you want to do something like this, it would be a time saver for you to have them prepared ahead of time.

Summer is a very busy time for all. For those going to a family reunion or on a research trip, it can be a very rewarding time. Especially if preparation is done ahead of time.

Fannie/Frances Irwin who married Howard Lewis Wagner, (or it could be her aunt by the same name who married Joseph McBee)

Photo of a woman and young girl and touching message from the school teacher on the back of the photo signed M.A.N.

Photo of couple, William and Stell Kitchen, very well dressed and good looking but i couldn't find out anything about them.

All the photos were taken in Corvallis Oregon around 1870-1890. The woman who owned this album was named Eugenia and her friends called her Genia.

Hopestill King New York Front Page

On May 9, 1850, Hopestill King Norton gave birth to triplets. Cynthis, Sarepta, and Nahum in Kings Valley, Oregon Territory. Cynthia died a few days later and is buried in Kings Valley Cemetery. Sarepta "Sis" and Nahum "Bub" survived and lived for many years after. Do you think they knew their birth made the front page of the *New York Herald*?

In the early days, everyone was interested in the west, especially those easterners who stayed behind. News out of the Oregon Territory made the front page of the *New York Herald* on Saturday, February 8, 1851 in a column titled "*Interesting From Oregon*" It is here that we find our own Hopestill King Norton and her triplets. This article discusses curious facts that the 1850 census agent, Mr. O'Neil, discovered about the Oregon population. Reported by the *Oregon Spectator*, it said "One family in Kings Valley, Polk County, the mother of which had three children at birth about five months previous, two of whom are still living, the other having died a short time before his visit.' Imagine! No telephopne, no telegraph, no cell phones, no e-mail, yet news of the birth of the Norton triplets in a tiny isolated valley on the west coast made it across the United States and onto the front page of a New York newspaper.
