Connecting the Generations

150 years ago where we were.....What were your ancestors doing in the same year?

Who replaced John Lewis's tombstone? Through this article in the 1980 Corvallis Gazette-Times, I met a new cousin. She and her sister travelled to cemeteries in Benton and Polk Counties, searching for our past generations and knew the tombstone had been replaced. Since our first conversation, we have spent many more years sharing family history.

Our John Lewis and his extended family came to Oregon by wagon train in 1845 and established the town of Lewisville. I learned that although his land claim was in Polk Co., he was an early land owner in Benton County, owning two lots and an improvement on 2nd Street in the village of Corvallis. Three of his children eventually settles in Benton County: Jeremiah V. Lewis, Nancy Lewis Cook, and Mary Ann Elizabeth Lewis Fuller. Later some of his grandchildren settled here too.

So where were they in 1857? John Lewis had died, however, his descendants remained in Oregon. John's granddaughter, who was my great grandmother, Mary Catherine Lewis Allen, married on her 15th birthday in 1856, lost an infant, and by November 1857 had another son. She and her family settled near Philomath. Our Lewis descendents continue to thrive in Benton County and elsewhere.

Introduction to Genetic Genealogy

Genetic Genealogy., the use of DNA testing to aide traditional genealogical research, is the newest and, perhaps, the most accurate research field for the family historian as it can prove or disprove family' connections. DNA testing can support a paper trail \which is often in question given the availability of surviving records

WHY TEST Your DNA?

- 1. Paper sources are inaccurate or missing
 - a. Living in a census household with the same surname isn't proof of a relationship
 - b. Letters or deeds calling someone a brother isn't proof
- 2. Adoptions and illegitimate children are not always recorded in written or oral history and have happened for thousands of years.
 - 3. Names changes not recorded
 - a Ancestor had to leave the country/state to escape from the law
 - b Ancestor wished to distinguish himself and his descendants with a
 - variation of his surname
 - c Spelling errors become the norm

How DNA helps Genealogists

- Determine if two people are related
- Determine if two people descend from the same ancestor
- Find out if you are related to others \\ith the same surname
- Prove or disprove your family tree research
- Prove or disprove oral history of relationships to famous or infamous people.
- Provide clues about your ethnic origin
- Find researchers interested in the same family lineage
- Use to document DAR lineage
- Save money not researching the wrong lines
