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### LaRea Vesta Gump

May 19, 1920 - April 20, 2007

She was born LaRea V. McMannis in Milo, MO to Marvin and Lela Austin McMannis. In the 1920's the family moved to Casper, WY. At the start of the Depression in the 1930's they moved back too Missouri. At the height of the Depression they moved to Idaho where they did not tarry long, and in 1937 moved to Vancouver, WA where LaRea finished high school. She met her future husband, Theodore Gump, while working at the Gifford Pinchot National Forest (formerly Columbia National Forest. LaRea and Ted were married October 6, 1956. They had one daughter, LeAnn, of whom LaRea was very proud.. LaRea had two brothers, John of Vancouver, WA and Maurice Simpson who passed away a few years ago. One of LaRea's main interests was working on the family genealogy and she was especially proud of her Maupin, Zumwalt and Austin ancestry. She travelled extensively in Europe.

She is survived by her husband, Theodore, daughter LeAnn, brother John McMannis and five of her six nieces and nephews. A funeral service was held April 26, 23007 at the McHenry Funeral Home in Corvallis.. A graveside service for family was held at Oak Lawn Memorial Park prior to burial.

Philadelphia, Baltimore & norther Virginia Yearly meetings—largest collection in the world of Quaker meeting archives "a vast resource for the genealogist"

The Quaker Collection, Haverford College Library, Haverford, PA 19041

Primarily published works by Quaker authors, collection for historians rather than genealogists; many microfilm reels – London, and other meetings.

Pendle Hill Library, Pendle Hill, Wallingford, PA 19086 – a limited collection

Friends Historical Collection of Guilford College, Greensboro, NC 27410

Depository of records of NC meetings (1680 onwards) – in Hinshaw's volume I (in library); also some Virginia records & south eastern US, plus files related to surnames.

Quaker Collection, Everett L. Cattell Library, Malone College, 515 25<sup>th</sup> St NW, Canton OH 44709 Ohio yearly meetings records, mostly mid-1800s & later, includes others from NC to Michigan

Quaker Collection, Shambaugh Library, George Fox College, Newberg, OR 97132

Hinshaw's vols, small number of published Quaker genealogies, archives of the Northwest Yearly meetings (mostly early 1900s)

# COZY HOME ON WHEELS WASHINGTON PARTY OF PLEASURE SEEKERS PASSED THROUGH SALEM YESTERDAY

# MEANS OF CONVEYANCE AN UP-TO-DATE TRAVELING WAGON, CONVIENTLY ARRANGED IN EVERY DETAIL—WILL EXTEND TRIP TO CALIFORNIA

An outing party on a pleasure trip, from the state of Washington, passed through Salem yesterday, in a most complete and up-to-date traveling wagon, drawn by four beautiful horses. The party left Seattle July 18th, having come by the way of Tacoma and Portland. The party will continue its trip through the Willamette and Rogue river valleys and then on to the Shasta Springs, where the members will camp for some time. From there they will continue on through Sacramento valley, will visit the Yosemite Park and then travel west to the coast and north along the coast to San Francisco where the party with its outfit, including horses, wagon and all will take passage on a steamer for Seattle.

The members of the party are as follows:

Dr. and Mrs. A.H. HOLCOMB and daughter; Mrs. A.L. HAWKINS and daughter of Seattle, C.W.HOLCOMB and Miss Dora HOLLEN of Everett. Mr. C. W. Holcomb is in his 77th year, but is hale and hearty and takes much pleasure in his novel outing.

Their means of conveyance is a large wagon with a canopy top, and is practically what might be called a cozy little home. Four large upholstered seats are so constructed that they can be made into beds, and on the canopy top are side curtains which can be drawn down, converting the wagon into a comfortable sleeping apartment. Under the front seat is a zinc lined refrigerator, being conveniently arranged for the storing of canned and fresh fruits, and sufficiently large to hold a good quantity of ice. Underneath the wagon bed and on each side are lockers which afford ideal cupboards for the storing of dishes and the necessaries of life. One side of the wagon opens out into steps providing easy access ti the little home on wheels. The rear end of the conveyance is so arranged that it can be adjusted and transformed into a table on which meals for the pleasure seekers are served. The body of the wagon is painted a deep red and hge top jet black, and altogether presents a splendid appearance.

The party is well provided with kodaks, guns, ammunition and fishing tackle, and fully equipped for a most enjoyable summer's outing. Two dogs which accompany the excursion, also seem to thoroughly enjoy the recreation and the new scenery. The trip will probably extend into the latter part of October.

The members of the outing party are acquaintances and friends of Floyd B. DAYTON, and during their brief stay in this city yesterday, Mr. Dayton entertained the visitors by showing them the sights of the city, and accompanying them n a visit to the state institutions.

### Catholic and french canadian genealogy

Thee first /Catholics to Oregon were French Canadians, then some of the early emigrants in the 1840's. All diocese have archives you may have to write to find out where parish records are. You can get addresses from the Archives of Archdiocese in Portland.

Books that may be of use are "Catholic Church Records of the Pacific Northwest", and George Brown's book, "18th Century French Canadians". All records in Quebec have been filmed.

Many French records were destroyed during the French Revolution, the use of nicknames to distinguish from others the same surname, infant baptism, and the use of Latin terms.

### USGenWeb Project Search

Searching the USGenWeb

The following is an announcement written by Daryl Lytton, Assistant Editor of the USGenWeb Newsletter:

For the first time in the 10-year history of The USGenWeb Project, a project-wide search is being enabled on a State-by-State basis at http://www.usgenweb-search.us/ with a great deal of success. The free-access USGenWeb, along with many of the state and county sites and Special Projects, are hosted by RootsWeb.com.

Although Search Us opened to the public on February 1st 2007 with only the 13 original states (and the last two, Alaska and Hawaii) searchable, 5,975 people visited the home page 8,699 times and conducted a total of 25,163 state searches during the month

February and March saw the addition of many more states, some now receiving as many as 1,000 searches per week. Yet more are being added in April, and it is expected that all states will be searchable by sometime in May or June.

Now, instead of a researcher asking, "I can't find your search, do you have anything on Jane Smith?" the researcher can say, "I found Jane Smith via your search, and have more information I would like to contribute to the USGenWeb."
