

Favorite Research Sites Excellent Site for Upstate New York newspapers

If you had relatives from upstate New York, check out "fultonhistory" site. It's an wonderful source for old newspapers. Areas included are Rochester, Elmira, Corning, Syracuse, Rome, Albany and even some New York City area newspapers. There are also many of the small town newspapers in these areas. State Archives

Having had the opportunity to spend some time researching in four state archives, I can say, without a doubt, they are gold mines. Not only do they have family vertical files which may never be digitized, but they also have drawers and drawers of

microfilm much of which has been indexed by dedicated genealogist, thank goodness. Of course, they have plenty of books, including those indexes, but also on county histories and families. Best of all, they are staffed by folks who know what they are doing and are extremely helpful. In addition, you sometimes get to actually hold the original in your hand. Just think, a letter written 200 years ago or a muster roll from the civil war. Definitely state archives are places to visit. Check out their online catalogs and perhaps their virtual vaults. 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Other Genealogy News & Events *Fold3's featured content this month is Mexican War Service Records.

"The U.S.-Mexican War determined the southwest border of the United States as we know it today. Fighting began after the 1845 annexation of



Texas and ended with the Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo on February 2, 1848. The territory gained would ultimately become the states of California, Nevada, Arizona, New Mexico, Utah, Texas, and Colorado, with portions contributing to Wyoming and Kansas.

Mexican War Service Records contain valuable first-hand information about battles, troop movements, officers, and soldiers. While the United States had a standing army at the time, most of the soldiers who fought in the Mexican War were volunteers from various states. At present, there are five sets of records on Fold3 with information on forty-four units, and the men who served in them, from Mississippi, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, Texas, and the Mormon Battalion.

Muster Rolls provide details on Promotions, Payments, Casualties, Those killed in battle and Deserters, as well as Physical descriptions. Unit information includes company muster rolls naming recruits, deserters, and those on special assignment; and regimental returns with battle histories and casualties. Company locations the National Palace Mexico. Lobas Island in the Gulf of Mexico, and Camp nr. Jalapa Mexico—provide geographic perspectives.

Other titles on Fold3 round out the Mexican War Collection. If you're interested in a

Pennsylvania soldier, alphabetical service record abstracts in the <u>Pennsylvania Archives</u> match the imaged service record cards within the state's two regiments. For Mormon Battalion soldiers, you can pair service records with the <u>Mormon Battalion Pension Files</u>.

Explore the <u>Mexican War Service Records</u> to learn more about the men who served in this geographically critical war."
