## **Genealogy 2009**

In 2009 there are sources for Family History information that us old timers never even dreamed of when we started out years ago.

You still need to start out filling in your Family Tree and Family Group Sheets. <u>Start with yourself</u>, Parents, then to Grandparents, etc., with Family Group Sheet Information you acquire as you go along

Record places and areas your ancestors were at. Also record in-law names as, particularly before 1940s relatives tended to migrate to the same geographic area. This gives you more names and places to search for.

There are four good sources for genealogy information:

#1. <u>Relatives</u> are still the best source

#### a. Yourself

- b. Second best and reliable source
  - 1. Mothers,
  - 2. Grandmothers might be even better
- c. Other relatives
- d. Seek out and ASK about relatives with Family History Interest
- e. Go visit your family and the places your families have been and are— (Cemeteries).

## **Newspaper Project Updated**

Another 1,000 surnames have been added to the Newspaper surname index posted online. The total events listed on this Newspaper Project is now up to 15,500. Some of the newspapers are available on CD for a modest cost.

### Looking for Benton County Residents between 1865 to July of 1925?

Anyone researching individuals who lived in Benton County between 1865 to July of 1925 may find interesting information in our Benton County Newspapers. To make it easier to locate newspaper events published about your family, our Benton County Genealogical Society volunteers have posted an updated Newspaper index online of over 15,500 events. Births, deaths, obituaries, marriages, legal references, and other items of interest such as family reunions are cited. A code beside the person's name and date of the published event indicate the newspaper where the information may be found. One of our volunteers or any researcher may use the surname index to quickly locate the newspaper articles on microfilm and make a copy.

## **Never Fail Scap**

5 lbs cracklings

1 gal soft water

1 can lye

Boil hard 20 minutes. Remove from heat and stir until thick. Perfume it if you like and pour it into molds, if you prefer. In the tub, it will do a marvelous job of washing soiled clothing.

Now that we have our soap, let's review how to wash clothes, as described by a pioneer woman. Note spelling.

## Washing Clothes Recipe

From a mailing list in Oregon:

Years ago an Alabama grandmother gave the new bride the following recipe:

This is an exact copy as written and found in an old scrapbook - with spelling errors and all.

Build fire in backyard to heat kettle of rain water. Set tubs so smoke wont blow in eyes if wind is pert. Shave one hole cake of lie soap in boilin water.

Sort things, make 3 piles 1 pile white, 1 pile colored, 1 pile work britches and rags.

To make starch, stir flour in cool water to smooth, then thin down with boiling water. Take white things, rub dirty spots on board, scrub hard, and boil, then rub colored don't boil just wrench and starch. Take things out of kettle with broom stick handle, then wrench, and starch. Hang old rags on fence. Spread tea towels on grass. Pore wrench water in flower bed. Scrub porch with hot soapy water. Turn tubs upside down. Go put on clean dress, smooth hair with hair combs. Brew cup of tea, sit and rock a spell and count your blessings.

Sometimes the land passed from one company to another, sometimes cemeteries are relocated, but more often families are losing track of where their ancestor's graves are located.

One of our major projects has been digitizing the Linn County Historical Newspapers (1895-1972). This is a wonderful resource, which we are in the process of indexing. Meanwhile, researchers can view and copy what they need.

Volunteers daily host the research room and now we can be open on weekends and one night a week to accommodate the working community. To accommodate out-of-town researchers, we will be glad to make appointments.

We are enclosing a copy of our current Publication Sales Catalog [which is now in the BCGS Library]. Yearly the obituaries from the Albany Democrat Herald are compiled and are now assembled into 40 volumes. There are several new cemetery volumes, as well as the 40 volumes containing the Oregon Donation Land Claim holder information.
