Register of Marriages and Baptisms

performed by Rev. John Cuthbertson Covenanter Minister 1751-1791

Banished from Scotland and arriving December 1685 at Perth Amboy NJ, 95 Covenanters (another 30 died in passage) were scattered at intervals throughout NJ, PA, NY, CT, DE, and SC. Other Covenanters not all banished also came to America.

Scottish Presbyterian under the leadership of John Knox won victory in Scotland against Roman Catholicism and in 1560 the Scottish Parliament accepted the reformation in its Calvinistic form. A long conformation followed with the Episcopalians (Church of England). After the revolution of 1688 the **Presbyterian Church** of Scotland was declared. Because some believed the old covenants were not included the reformed Presbyterian Church of Scotland (the Covenanters) was formed in 1743 by these descanters.

One of John Calvin's principles was that God had made a covenant (constitution) with man—do as the Biblical principles then God must in turn do as agreed. As rulers claim they rule by absolute divine right, having duties to their constituents is in conflict with their desire for absolute power—so arrived in early America the Covenanters.

In 1751, the first Reformed Presbyterian Missionary to America, Rev. John Cuthbertson an educated and licensed minister from Scotland arrived. Rev. Cuthbertson's principle Society was at Middle Octoraro, Lancaster Co PA. From here he traveled the next 40 years by horse, foot, and boat more than 70,000 miles, nearly all near or on the frontier, including the times of the French-Indian and Revolutionary Wars, continually performing marriages, baptisms, sacraments, and services.

His diaries have survived, are reproduced, and have been separately indexed as to 600 marriages, 1800 child baptisms, 5000 different families, and 500 places indexed by counties in seven states. His ministry was primarily in se PA, after a supportive part of his congregation removed to upstate NY he made frequent trips there, always ministering in PA, NJ, and other sites along the way, sidetracking into ME, DE, and CT.

Look for your names in all the separate indexes.

I have included the parts (researched separately) about their religion as it allowed me to establish more certainty about my McMillan and Park families who were latter known to have been involved with the Presbyterian Church and Home Missionary Service. Also found are many Brown's and some Ross's names know to have family associations in Canada. I did find 12-15 of my direct ancestors

Spotlight: The DeKalb History Center by Valerie Beaudrault www.dekalbhistory.org/index.html

DeKalb County, located in north central Georgia was created in 1822 from Fayette, Gwinnett, and Henry counties. Until the formation of Fulton county in 1853, Atlanta was part of DeKalb County. Decatur, home to the DeKalb History Center, is the county seat. Click on the Online Research link on the homepage to access the website's databases.

Cemetery Database: This database indexes marriage records recorded in DeKalb County for the period from 1840 to 1900 that were transcribed by Franklin Garett in 1930 and 1931

Freedman Record: This database contains information about all free African-Americans residing in DeKalb County from 1851-1864

1821 Georgia Land Lottery for DeKalb County: This database contains records from the 1821 Georgia seven land lotteries to distribute the land ceded by the Creek Nation of Indians to the United States via the Treaty of Indian Springs (January 8, 1821).

1870 and 1910 Census Records Databases: These databases contain surname indexes to the 1870 and 1910 federal census for DeKalb County. DeKalb Confederate Database: This alphabetical database contains the names of DeKalb County's Confederate soldiers. Land Records Database: This database indexes deeds showing transfers of land recorded in the DeKalb County Courthouse from 1820 through 1903.

Superior Court Records Database (1836-1843): There was a fire at the DeKalb County courthouse in 1842 that destroyed most of the records. The minute book indexed here is the only volume of official county records that survived the fire. The volume covers all cases tried in the DeKalb Superior Court between 1836 and 1843.

Will Records Database: This database indexes DeKalb County wills for the period from August 1839 through October 1917. Stone Mountain Cemetery: Click on the "Information on the Confederate Soldiers Buried in Stone Mountain Cemetery" link to view a document containing detailed information not only about the cemetery and the veterans buried there, but also a history of the town of Stone Mountain during and after the Civil War.

Wakarusa is a town in Harrison and Olive townships in Elkhart County, Indiana. It is in the north-central part of the state, not far from the Michigan border. The Wakarusa Public Library's Historical Room Collection includes an online obituary database. The records are from the late nineteenth and early to mid twentieth centuries. The database can be searched by first name and last name and searches can be limited by providing a range of dates for the deceased's birth and death. The search results are returned as an alphabetical list of full names.

The Not-So-Good News from Sorenson Molecular Genealogical Foundation By Gene Newcomb

As some of you may know by now, the latest release of DNA profiles came out at the end of last month. While their usual profile releases have included tens of thousands of new profiles, this one was for fewer than 2000. One of the directors of the Foundation said that it was mostly a clean up release and that they have accomplished their goal of collecting a certain number of samples world wide. It may be that the death of the founder has created a situation that has lead to a restructuring of the goals of the Foundation.

Here is the text of the e-mail release that I received: "SMGF is happy to announce the addition of new haplotypes and genealogical records to the Sorenson mtDNA and Y-chromosome databases. We invite you to search these updated databases to find new family connections at http://www.smgf.org. As a research organization, SMGF's top priorities are to protect both the privacy of our participants and the integrity of the information stored in our databases. As an added security measure, users will now be required to enter a user name and password to search the free SMGF Y and mtDNA databases. If you do not already have a user account you can create one [at the site].,,"

A number of the comments that I read on line were reports of not finding any new data for the person writing the message or their families, but a couple of people did find new profiles. My suggestion is that you log-in to the site and create a user account. Then for male samples try your family name to see if there is anything on the yDNA report. For both male and female samples check the mtDNA results by trying the maiden name of someone in the exclusively female line (mother, mother's mother, mother's mother's mother, etc.). In either case there is a little branched tree on its side on the left side of each profile. If you click on that you will find a pedigree tree with the sample donor at the left marked as 'protected', but earlier family members who have birth years of over 100 years ago will be visible and you should be able to recognize your family. If all else fails, you may give me the names and I will check to see if any of our samples have been processed. My e-mail address and phone number are on the newsletter or you could send a letter to the BCGS post box requesting help.

By the way if instead of seeing names there are just numbers, click on them and it will bring up the Family Search sheet for that individual. That means that either you or some other interested party has submitted your data to the LDS church. I found that part of my family has been given to them.

If there is evidence that some of our results have been posted I will go into the details of what to do with that information in a later newsletter.

Informative Articles from Ancestry

"Ancestry" for January-February, 2009, has many informative articles. "Be a Fashion Detective" gives a one-page listing of common styles in different decades which just might help you establish a time period for some of your mystery photos. For instance: "1863-1873 —Triangular Silhouette The bird-cage is replaced by cone-shaped hoops. Flat-front, gored skirts and princess-line dresses eliminate unnecessary gathers around the waist." "Patient Records. Patience Required." This article give some hints about how to access hospital records, which are often considered private and difficult to get at. It suggests that using the name of the locality "+ hospital records + archives" in a search engine may yield results. In addition, try the Family History Library Catalog, as older records may have been microfilmed. "At the Top of the Class" points out that school records can be of great help in turning up birth date and place, middle names, sibling names and ages, and previous school attended. A town or county history may contain an education section with details of teachers, pupils & school officials. The District Office may have directories, family census records, lists of graduates and more. Look at the article for other great ideas to help track down details of your family.
