Mexico Vital Records

The following was written by FamilySearch:

The Record Search pilot has added 72 million new names to its Mexico Baptism collection online. The collection was transcribed from Mexico parish records dating from 1659 to 1905, and is not necessarily complete for any particular place or region. It also includes records from the Middle America Vital Records Index –Mexico that was published in 1999 on CD only. The newly expanded database can be searched for free at: http://pilot.familysearch.org. The data was transcribed by FamilySearch's impressive force of volunteer indexers worldwide

(see www.familysearchindexing.org). Volunteers donate a little time each week or month transcribing select information from digital images of original source documents using FamilySearch's online indexing utility. Social Security Death Index

The Social Security Death Index is a database that all genealogists use and find a very valuable tool. Many questions arise when we use this database. Recently RootsWeb Newsletter had an article concerning this database.

In 1935 President Roosevelt signed the Social Security Act which provided benefits to eligible citizens. A number was given to those paarticipating in the program. Thus we have the Social Security number.

The Social Security Administration does NOT publish the master file or index. It sells the database to others who make it publically accessible and searchable. Various companies offer the index but in different forms. So all Social Security Death Indexes are not the same.

What you will find on the Social Security Death Index is someone who died after 1962. Why 1962? That is the year the Social Security Administration began digitizing its records. The index may have some who are Canadiana, Mexicans and other nationalities. Some Americans who died while abroad may also be found in the index. A few who died prior to 1962 may also be found.

Not all persons are listed on the Social Security database. The death may not have been reported to the Social Security Administration. The death may be to recent and not yet indexed. The person may not have participated in the Social Security program.

Remember, everyone was not required to have a Social Security number until 1988. Farmers, housewives, government employees, unemployed persons, and persons under other retirement programs may not have Social Security numbers. If you do find a person you are looking for on a database, you may click on the SS-5 request letter. The SS-5 is the form the person filled out to request a Social Security number. It will contain the complete birth information as well as mother's maiden name. It will cost \$27.00 to receive a copy of this form.

New DNA Company Alert

The following information is being sent to you was written by a well respected Genetic Genealogist. This article is a result of other ISOGG members raising concerns about the new DNA testing being offered by an application on Facebook.

Most of you may not deal with Facebook nor MySpace, but many, many genealogists are beginning to network using these. I am on Facebook and there are hundreds of genealogists and many, many Genetic Genealogists there. As DNA is becoming a huge household word, many people are trying to cash in on DNA testing. This, in most cases, is quite harmful to those companies which are reputable. This low level of quality in service will make finding new testers a problem as over time people will become disgruntled if they buy from such places only to learn later they were fooled. These types of companies are taking advantage of people, and I urge all of you to caution others to do their homework and go with only reliable companies. Although the info below pertains to just one company, there are several others which do not have good organization or good service. We are now receiving complaints on these companies. One main one is Ancestry.com. Please educate people you know not to use companies who do not provide good service or who aren't in the DNA business with a real focus on genealogy. My friend Rebekah wrote the following and gave permission for it to be used here and anywhere else it is needed to help. If you are an Admin, please forward it to your members.

Rebekah wrote: -- Familybuilder -- I shall be beginning this week's updates with a bit of unpleasantness.

A fellow DNA Project Administrator has pointed out that there is another company entering the Genetic Genealogy business. This is Familybuilder. In the past they have been the providers of family tree software for networking websites such as Facebook. Ordinarily, I would say that competition is healthy for any industry. This company plans to operate though at a standard below that of any of the companies already out there.

They do not plan to make money only by selling you a test and service but by selling their database built with users' DNA. "We may also sell, rent or otherwise disclose the anonymized DNA analyses of our customers and any related anonymized studies to third parties." http://www.familybuilder.com/privacypolicy

Their privacy policy absolves them of all responsibility for the maintenance of your privacy once they pass information on to their unnamed testing lab.

"We are not responsible, and you agree that you will not hold us liable, for any actions of such third party, including disclosure by the third party of your confidential information, the content of the analysis provided by the third party, or for any other actions taken or omitted by the third party, or for any consequences, direct or indirect resulting from actions taken by the third party." http://www.familybuilder.com/dnatermsconditions

We work in an environment where we are already have to gain the confidence of leery relatives. I think that this blatant abuse of trust is the last thing that we need. Please read the privacy policies of any company carefully. Let your friends and relatives know that they should test at a company that is responsible and sells DNA services and not their users.

FAMILY TREE DNA MORE ON HURRICANE IKE

As a follow-up to our letter informing you of the level of preparedness Family Tree DNA established regarding the coming of Hurricane Ike to Houston, we are coming to you now to update you on our status post-Ike.

- a) As you may know, all of our standard Y-DNA and mtDNA tests are processed at the lab in Arizona, and therefore, this processing has not been affected at all.
- b) Also, as we advised previously, we have taken appropriate measures to safeguard and protect the data and our servers and therefore all computer systems are in place and functioning normally. You may have noticed that our web sites have been up, available, and are running normally as they were before and during the storm.
- c) The building where Family Tree DNA's offices and Houston laboratory are located is without power, like most of Houston office buildings, and sustained damage, like so many other Houston office buildings. This means that the building will be closed for the next few days until it is ready for tenants to return. Despite this situation, several members of our staff have worked over the weekend to transfer equipment to other locations so that our normal office operations can resume on Monday, or at the latest on Tuesday, from an alternate location. All postal mail will be picked up normally at our local post office, so that kits can be checked-in and processed normally.
- d) The coming days will allow us to have a better assessment of when our Houston lab will resume normal operations, at which point we will be back to you again with additional information about any delays in delivering results for the advanced tests that our lab processes in Houston. (Advanced panels, FGS and Deep Clade Y SNP's)

Please forgive us if in the next few days we don't meet our standard level of customer service as to e-mails and phone calls. We will be back to normal as soon as possible. We appreciate your continued support.

Wiki adds Resources to FamilySearch Research

Genealogical researchers have a new, easy-to-use tool providing sources for research. FamilySearch Research Wiki, which is in beta testing, is an "encyclopedia of research sources" from around the world, said Jim Greene, Wiki product manager. Greene said he hopes that within three to four months, the program will be formally released, with a link on The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints' familysearch.org Web site. Until then, Wiki can be found at **wiki.familysearch.org**.

"The idea behind Wiki is let's create a community landing page where we can share knowledge, share tips and tricks, tell people what's successful, what works, what's the latest information out there". FamilySearch.org helps with genealogical research, but researchers eventually will have to look beyond it, Greene said. That is where Wiki comes in. There is a huge surge of source documents being added on the Internet every day, Greene said, coming from areas like Indexing and Record Search, both part of FamilySearch. Wiki is the place searchers can go to find out where all these different sources are located, Greene said. Greene said that, like the Web site www.wikipedia.org, anyone can share information about genealogy sources on Wiki. The community provides all of the content, he said. To edit and add content, users need to set up an account with the site. "We don't want to know about your ancestors; we don't want success stories. What we want is a list of sources and materials that are available for people to go look up their ancestors".

Once users set up an account and find a page of interest, they can choose the "watch" application and have all updates on the page e-mailed to them. Greene said that Wiki is one of the "collaborative, next-generation Internet applications" that make up Web 2.0. Other Web 2.0 applications include blogs, forums, Facebook and other social networking sites, he said.

"Wiki isn't the last place to look, but if it's the first, you'll be more successful".
