Researchers Bob Zybach and Janet Meranda presented the fascinating program

Space doesn't permit us to do justice to the remarkable saga described in "A Light in the Wilderness", a historical work of fiction by Jane Kirkpatrick, which was available at the program and now at Amazon.com as both printed and e-books. Zybach and Meranda expect to publish their factual, historical research of Leticia Carson and her husband perhaps in two years.

What a remarkable, well spent hour that was; it reminded me to do more than merely think of a book I hope to write of our Coast Range town's history. How about you, are making any progress in your writing or research? Winter is ahead, a good time to hunker down and return to our work when the rains drum on the roof! October's program on Saturday, October 11 at 11am will be presented by Kenneth Runningcrane-Real who is Lakota and a registered member of the Cheyenne River Sioux Tribe; Ken will be talking about First Nation (Native) names and the process used by the BIA and various churches for treaty and tribal rolls which is useful for tracking family/tribal trees. Ken grew up on Indian reservations in Montana and South Dakota and received his primary education in church and BIA schools. Ken retired from the US Army in 2000 spending 20 years as a Cavalry Scout. After leaving the Army Ken was a Police Officer in Oregon; currently Ken has a Craft business specializing in Pow Wow and Native Ceremonial Regalia. He also gives lectures on native customs, traditions, and issues in public schools and universities.

An example of what FindMyPast, another subscription service (available to use in the Corvallis Family History



Center) offers is listed in an announcement from August 2014 - Ron D: Findmypast has added Australian records:

inbound passenger lists to Victoria, 1839-1923 (2,125,578 records) and outbound from Victoria 1852-1915 (1,753,919 records).

These inbound and outbound passenger lists will usually contain names, estimated birth years, nationalities, native places, month and year of arrival, ship name, destination port and departure port, so they contain a lot of information that can be instrumental in filling in blanks that you may have in your research.

Curious about the former occupants of your town or home? Trying to write a history or round out your ancestors' environment? This could be useful in writing a family history or other story! - Ron D "With **CensusReporter**, you can type in the name of your town and you can start scrolling through all kinds of census data. You'll see charts that let you absorb the information at a glance, along with comparisons to regional and state numbers.

Have you ever wondered about the people who used to live in your house? **Census Tool** may be able to help. You can find your old house in the 1940 and earlier U.S. census records and then discover a little about what life was like for its former residences. Library of Congress Offers a New Collection of Depression Era Photographs The Library of Congress has a great collection of photographs from the Great Depression that has recently been updated. The collection now contains more than 175,000 portraits of America between the years 1935 and 1945, taken by photographers of the government's Farm Security Administration. The photographs also include all known data about the subject(s) in each photo, including the date and location of the photograph and also the name of the photographer. A little-known program of the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) and Immigration provides genealogy information that may be difficult or impossible to obtain elsewhere. The records include naturalization files, visa applications, and citizenship

tests, and may reveal family secrets and mysteries. In addition to relatives, historians or researchers can also request files. The documents typically include immigration information, often (but not always) including exact hometowns in their ancestors' native countries. The files often have information on brothers, sisters, aunts and uncles. Many times it is useful to obtain the records of your uncles, aunts, and cousins who also immigrated from "the old country."
