Rules for Teachers - 1872

The following was found in the Crook County Genealogical Society Newsletter for January, February and March on page 2.

- 1. Teachers each day will fill lamps, clean chimneys.
- 2. Each teacher will bring a bucket of water and a scuttle of coal for the days session.
- 3. Make your pens carefully. You may whittle nibs to the individual taste of the pupils.
- 4. Men teachers may take one evening each week for courting purposes, or two evenings a week if they go to church regularly.
- 5. After ten hours in school, the teachers may spend the remaining time reading the Bible or other good books.
- 6. Women teachers who marry or engage in unseemly conduct will be dismissed.
- 7. Every teachers should lay aside from each pay a goodly sum of his earnings for his benefit during his declining years so that he will not become a burden on society.
- 8. Any teacher who smokes, uses liquor in any form, frequents pool or public halls, or gets shaved in a barber shop will give good reason to suspect his worth, intention, integrity and honesty.
- 9. The teacher who performs his labor faithfully and without fault for five years will be given an increase of twenty-five cents per week in his pay, providing the Board of Education approves.

The "International Vital Records Handbook" is a great source for information about ordering vital records from <u>any</u> country in the world. It contains the necessary forms that can be copied and sent off to the appropriate agency.

The "Female Index to Genealogical Dictionary of the First Settlers of New England" fills an important gap in the four volume Genealogical Dictionary (which the Library owns) done by Savage in the 1860s. Until Patty Barthell Myers compiled this "Female Index," it was very difficult to trace females, as they were scattered throughout the four volumes, some under father's names, some under husbands' names. If the husbands' names were not known, these ladies could not be found. This index lists them by maiden name and all married names.

Researching the Town POOR PEOPLE with our own Billee Hoornbeek. Billee has collected data and information about the treatment (and documentation) of the town poor for a period of 200 years.

It was long the custom (requirement) in Europe that besides registering births for purposes of taxes, public work, and the military; they were also for the poor. The parish was not required to take care of those who weren't registered at birth or were later accepted into the parish. This resulted in the keeping of long term records. Another popular way of dealing with the poor was to load them up in ships and send them to America--records of which remain from the boat manifests.

This custom of registering births was carried over to the new world particularly in New England where the towns replaced the parishes. Many of these records still exist mostly in a state of disorganization as Billee found out.

Members pointed out that there are prison, court, welfare, and intuition records concerning the poor. As a genealogist you could be lucky to have had a criminal in your past as their intuition and court records likely remain.

Genetic Map of Europe:

The **genetic map of Europe**, which shows the genetic relationships between various European populations and which was published in *Current Biology*, "bears a clear structural similarity to the geographic map," the *New York Times's* Nicholas Wade writes. "The major genetic differences are between populations of the north and south (the vertical axis of the map shows north-south differences, the horizontal axis those of east-west). The area assigned to each population reflects the amount of genetic variation in it." Finland is quite divergent, as is, to a lesser extent, southern Italy.

Using Domestic Names from the US Board on Geographical Names

The Board on Geographical Names, BGN, is a service of the US government and is meant to provide access to information about geographical locations. One small part of BGN, Domestic Names, contains more than two million physical and cultural features located throughout the US and its Territories. For more details see the Wikipedia articles on Board of Geographical Names (http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/United_States_Board_on_Geographic_Names).

The list of Domestic Names has several uses. I've used it for years to provide the county name to associate to the city and state name for facts I enter in my genealogy program. I've used it to find historic locations although it doesn't always have the name I desire. It also has the ability to show the location you found on a digital map such as Google Maps, USGS maps or Mapquest.

Access BGN at http://geonames.usgs.gov/. Choose "Search Domestic Names". On the Query Form enter your desired location as the "Feature Name". You can further limit the search by specifying the State, State and County, and/or choosing a Feature Class (or select multiple feature classes). Click "Send Query" to get a screen of first 15 matches (if it redisplays the query screen, click "Send Query" again). Entering "Richland" returns 851 locations in several states including AR, GA, IA, IL, and WA so it is often best to limit your queries to a specific state. Searching for Richland limited to Washington state results in 19 matches. Each match reports the name of the feature, latitude, longitude and the name of the USGS map where it will be found.

Check out the available features classed – there are about 60 different features classes including school, airport, cemetery, populated place, post office, lake and river. Searching on "Cemetery" in Benton County, WA results in 5 cemeteries.

Clicking on one of the feature names brings up another screen with more detail about that location including a citation for the entry and the entry date. It also includes a box labeled Mapping Services. Choosing a mapping tool will let you view a map based on the latitude and longitude provided.

The Domestic Names on the BGN site are actively expanded. In the last 2 months the count for Richland went from 769 to 851 and that for Richland, in Washington from 16 to 19.

Check BGN out! Use it to provide details on geographic locations for you family history.
