Genie Doings

Eastman's Online Genealogical Newsletter

A great resource for things new in the world of family history or genealogy is the Eastman's On-Line Genealogical Newsletter. There is a free, limited version, e-mailed to subscribers and a more in depth version which is available for a fee. I have the free version and benefit from the broad survey. (Thanks to Margaret Fox for the heads up.)

A recent newsletter included an article describing the on-line, interactive version of "The Atlas of the Historical Geography of the US in 1932." It provides amazing detail & depth of America from

as early as pre-1500 to 1932. The visuals help provide a picture of what life was like for families then. A description of the Atlas and a link to it is in this excerpt from Dick Eastman's newsletter, dated 27 Dec 2013:



Charles O. Paullin published his monumental Atlas of the Historical Geography of the United States in 1932. It contains nearly 700 maps covering seemingly every facet of the country's social, economic and political life, including maps, then novel, showing county-by-county results for presidential elections going back to the beginning of the Republic.

Now, modern bells and whistles have also come to Paullin's atlas. A souped-up online version has just been released by the University of Richmond's Digital Scholarship Lab, bringing what some historians still consider a work of unsurpassed scope into the age of the iPad.

"Paullin's maps show ordinary people making a living, moving across the landscape, worshiping at churches, voting in elections," said Robert K. Nelson, the director of the Digital Scholarship Lab. "They covered so many topics that there's really something for everyone."

I the undersigned George S Wolff being of sound mind & body write this my last will and testament Fifty cents (50¢) be paid to my son-in-law Chas W Wensel a native of Huntingdon Pa. to enable him to buy for himself a good stout rope with which to hang himself & thus rid mankind of one of the most infamous scoundrels that ever roamed this broad land or dwelt outside of a penitentiary
