
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# Purpose

#### **Library News**

Come by the genealogy library this summer. It will be open Tuesdays and Saturdays from 1-3:30 p.m. on those days. The Saturday time is new, so see you there! You might come across an intriguing book as I did.

While doing a recent inventory of our library, I found the book *Finding Your Mexican Ancestors* by George and Peggy Ryskamp. Because my brother-in-law is of Mexican ancestry, I took a good look at the book. Previously, I had used ancestry.com's database and found the border crossing records of his maternal


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grandfather. One of the records even had a photo of the grandfather and his first wife, albeit a little fuzzy. When I sent the picture to my niece, she was thrilled because she had never seen a picture of her great-grandfather. Besides the photo, the record gave his full name and the state he was from in Mexico. How exciting that was to find!



The border crossing cards are only a small part of what is available for those who are searching for their Mexican ancestors. This book by the Ryskamps teaches how to find not only U.S. records but → Mexican records as well. They suggest, after you've found the

ancestral hometown, using the Mexican civil registration records and parish records to find your ancestors. The civil registration records are fairly straightforward because of the consistent way they were written. And the parish records, in some cases, go back to the 1500's.

One chapter is devoted to finding and working with Mexican records, including a section on how to interpret old Spanish language documents. It's similar to becoming familiar with old English documents-the more experience you have, the easier it is to figure out what the word is!

The authors also write about Mexican history to provide a context for your genealogy research. Along with the how-to portions of the book, there are some great appendices. You don't know Spanish, you say? One appendix is a glossary of Spanish words that might be found in the records. Others cover internet sites for Mexican genealogy, researching in the archives, and research forms. To quote the back cover blurb, "If you don't have Mexican ancestors, this book will make you wish you had." I might add that there are some good search tips in the book for everyone, no matter your ancestry.

# Are Digital Libraries Going to Replace Traditional Books?

Is it time to stop the presses?



It seems that every week I report in this newsletter about more and more genealogy books that are being converted to electronic format. Sure, old books have been digitized for several years now. However, even new books are now appearing as electronic publications. The Kindle, Nook, and other e-book readers are hot items these days. Now the world's first completely paperless public library is scheduled to open this summer in San Antonio, Texas.

The so-called BiblioTech is a low-cost project with big ambitions. It will have 100 e-readers on loan, and dozens of screens where the public will be able to browse, study, and learn digital skills. However it's likely most users will access BiblioTech's initial holding of 10,000 digital titles from the comfort of their homes, way out in the Texas hinterland.

The new, all-digital library gained impetus from the success of the University of Texas San Antonio (UTSA) bookless engineering school library which opened three years ago, the first paperless academic library.
