Genealogy News & Events

PRONI (Northern Ireland) Updated Name Search

The Public Records Office of Northern Ireland (PRONI) continues to add Irish records online (for free). These come from the records which they hold – usually from the originals. Anyone researching ancestors in Northern Ireland will want to visit PRONI online.

On 11 March a major new update to the Name Search facility was launched on the PRONI website. Eight further pre-1858 will indexes have been added, containing around 53,000 new entries and the index to coroners' inquests has been extended by ten years to 1920.

These entries are in addition to the pre-1858 administration bond indexes, fragments of the 1740 and 1766 religious census returns and 1775 dissenters petitions already available on Name Search. The application now provides a searchable index to thousands of records as early as 1608. The new indexes cover the dioceses of Armagh, Clogher, Connor, Down and Kilmore. Given the loss of census records for Ireland prior to 1901, these records will be of great interest to genealogists tracing their family tree as far back as the 17th century.

Although most pre-1858 wills do not survive, the indexes provide information of use to genealogists, such as the names of the deceased, their address, the date of the grant of probate or administration and occasionally their occupation. Previously users would have to come to PRONI and spend considerable time searching these indexes. Now they are available anywhere in the world and can be searched in seconds.

The completion of this major project is a valuable addition to PRONI's online resources and a mark of its commitment to helping make the archives available to everyone.

Quality historic resources enrich this pedestrian-friendly tour. Enjoy the celebration of historic preservation month and the Corvallis Sustainability Coalition's Natural Areas Week. Built and natural resources are all part of our cultural landscape. Guided tours of the historic 1850s Fiechter House and nearby Cabell Barn begin at 11 o'clock. Bring-your-own picnic lunch to enjoy from noon to 1:00 p.m., while the Corvallis Community Band provides lively music. From noon to 2:00 p.m., watch a demonstration of sustainable horse-drawn forestry management. At 1 o'clock, learn about Native American's sustainable agricultural practices. At 2 o'clock there will be a short presentation on the Big Barn near Refuge Headquarters. Conclude this informative event with a self-guided tour of the National Register-listed Cheadle-Irwin Barn, or enjoy a guided Wildflower Walk on Woodpecker Loop.

OSU Walking Tour

Tour limited to 20 persons; for reservations (541) 737-0540

OSU is Corvallis' newest historic district with more than 80 contributing structures and the only Oregon Campus listed in the National Register of Historic Places. Learn about the development of campus structures and early Olmsted and Taylor campus plans, quads, and view sheds. Appreciate the most comprehensive collection of distinctive John V. Bennes-designed buildings.

10 Tuesday Fort Hoskins Guided Tour

11:00 a.m. - 12:30 p.m. Fort Hoskins Historic Park: West on Hwy 20 to Hwy 223 North; west on Hoskins Rd; follow signs; meet at picnic shelter.

In 1856 the US Army established Fort Hoskins to protect coastal Indian reservations. The 130-acre site tells the story of military presence in the Willamette Valley and Coastal Range. The guided tour program interprets military life at the post, archeological study of the site, and management of the cultural landscape, historic structures, and natural resources. Bring a lunch to enjoy in the picnic shelter before continuing to additional afternoon programs in Kings Valley.

Beazell Memorial Forest Education Center Tour & Guided Hike

1:00 p.m., 37283 Kings Valley Hwy (Hwy 223), Kings Valley

Tour of Education Center, followed at 1:30 by 2+-hour round trip hike to South Meadow.

The 1930s Plunkett family barn, constructed from lumber milled on the site, now serves as the Beazell Forest Education Center. The project features low impact construction and maintenance, guided by reduce, reuse, and recycle values.

The Beazell Memorial Forest is a preserve of 586 acres of temperate rainforest. Hear the management plan for the forest as well as restoration efforts of native upland prairies in support of rare Taylor's Checkerspot butterflies. The butterflies frequent only two sites in Oregon, both in Benton County, one in the South Meadow. The round trip tour includes a challenging hike to the South Meadow to possibly view the butterflies.

12 Thursday Franklin School Neighborhood & Tree Tour

2:00 p.m., Meet at Franklin School, 750 NW 18th St, east entrance under the Pin Oak

Go green; take a neighborhood walk! Celebrate the enduring companionship of heritage trees in the historic Franklin School Neighborhood. This one-hour guided tour includes the 1889 Franklin Square Park, Corvallis' oldest park and home to more than 15 different tree species.

The 1922 Italian Renaissance movie palace offers introductory tours to this National Register of Historic Places downtown Corvallis icon. 18 Wednesday Hull-Oakes Sawmill Tour

10:45 a.m. Meet at Benton County Planning Office, 360 SW Avery to carpool to Sawmill. South on 99W, 13 miles to Dawson Rd; west 6 miles; park near Sawmill office for 11:45 a.m. Orientation.

The Hull-Oakes Lumber Company is one of the last steam-powered sawmills in the nation, processing large-dimension products used wordwide, including restoration of the *USS Constitution* and national parks lodges. Two steam boilers from the early 20th century power the head rig, band saw, edger, and smaller saws. Sawdust is used as fuel in this highly sustainable operation. Once a shipping point, warehouse district, and industrial area, today's Riverfront Park honors downtown Corvallis' early past. Appreciate the sites that built Corvallis' early local economy. Linger where historic rehabilitation projects fostered dynamic retail growth along 2nd Street. Learn how downtown changed, and yet remained the same inviting place.

Annual Preservation Awards Ceremony & Lewisburg Grange Centennial Celebration

Noon - 4:00 p.m. Open House and tours celebrating the Grange Centennial. 4:30 p.m. *Grange Rehabilitation Conversations* with Linda Dodson and Allen Nelson. Awards Ceremony follows; reception follows awards.

Built in 1911, the Colonial Revival style Mountain View Grange No. 429 was later renamed Lewisburg Grange. The Oregon State Grange organized in 1893 to help farmers collectively address common issues and served as community centers.

Each year the Corvallis and Benton County Historic Resources Commissions and PreservationWORKS recognize outstanding contributions to the preservation of historic resources. This celebration begins with short tours of the Lewisburg Grange, honoring its Centennial. Linda Dodson and Allen Nelson will discuss the rehabilitation process for the Grange Hall. The Awards Ceremony immediately follows to acknowledge those leaders and stewards, who demonstrate outstanding commitment to maintaining, protecting, and celebration our shared heritage.

22 Sunday Camp Adar/Adair Air Force Station/SAGE Direction Center Tour

2:00 - 3:30 p.m. Meet at Adair City Hall; 99W north 5.5 - 6 mi. from Walnut Blvd; right on Vandenburg, left on William R Carr Ave. Interpretive display, guided tours of rehabilitated Barracks, Fire Station, and NORAD Block Building

Originally a World War II army cantonment, Camp Adair transformed 50,000 acres of family farms to a post of 1,800 buildings. Home to infantry, artillery and engineering units with 33,000 personnel, Camp Adair became Oregon's second largest city. After WWII the post hospital served returning veteran patients. During the cold war, air defense facilities added another layer of military history to Adair. Visit Locke Cemetery

Cemetery driveway .3 mi west of 99W on Lewisburg Rd

In 1855, A. N. Locke deeded two acres for this burial ground to the citizens of Benton County. The Anna Hugart burial may be the first Oregon Trail immigrant to die within current Benton County boundaries.

Listed in the National Register of Historic Places, Crystal Lake Cemetery was established in 1860. Joseph Alexander deeded 5.3 acres of his 1849 Donation Land Claim to the Masons' Corvallis Lodge #14 for a cemetery.

This annual ceremony honors courageous heroes who served and sacrificed for our freedom.
