Deep Clade Test

Family Tree DNA is pleased to announce that all Deep Clade test options have been updated according to the 2008 Y-Chromosome Phylogenetic Tree.

New SNPs and haplogroup branches have been discovered and published, which have now been integrated into the Deep Clade testing panels. Customers who are currently waiting for Deep Clade test results will automatically be upgraded to the new testing panels at no additional fee. Participants who previously ordered Deep Clade tests and for whom some new SNPs may be informative will be offered a Deep Clade test extension, as applicable. The new Deep Clade testing system is designed to determine a participant's placement on the haplogroup tree. The test begins with their predicted haplogroup and tests whatever SNPs are necessary in order to determine their haplogroup assignment on the tree. Results of all SNPs tested are reported to the customer as they are completed.

Deep Clade tests are available for haplogroups E1b1b, G, I, J, and R (includes R1a, R1b, and integrates the U series SNPs within R1b).

Finding Your Results from SMGF

President Bill Gleaves has been asking at our meetings if anyone has gotten their results back from Sorenson Molecular Genealogy Foundation. The first point is that they will NEVER send you your results. The Free Sample Analysis that they do does not come with any benefits or services. SMGF does allow us to look at their wonderful collected database of DNA analyses and pedigrees, but it is up to you to use that database to determine if they have completed some or all of the work on your sample. You can access their database by going to www.smgf.org, clicking on "the database", then "Y -Chromosome Database" or "Mitochondrial Database" then "Search the Database". At the search you enter either your family surname for the Ychromosome or the maiden name of a maternal line (mother's mother's, mother) ancestress who was born over 100 years ago. Do this with a limited number of differences (either none, one, or two at most) indicated in the check boxes that you will see there. You will then get a list of people who fit your criterion. If the name you are searching for is a common one like Smith or Jones you may have to search for several pages to find the people who fit your family. If possible, choose an uncommon name rather than a common one. There is a little pedigree symbol at the left of each DNA sequence which you can click and get a pedigree which should tell you if you have the right family. If you fail to find anything the first time you do this, remember to make a bookmark for the search page so that you can do this quickly on subsequent occasions.

If you are unable to search for these databases because you do not have a computer, please let me know and I will look for you.

When we start to get results back, I will work with people either individually or in a group setting.

If all this seem like too much work and you are willing to spend \$19.50 you can use the networking site GeneTree mentioned below. They will check at SMGF for your results and send out an announcement to you with an analysis of your exact mitochondrial DNA results (perhaps later they will do the same thing for Y-chromosome DNA). This again assumes that you have computer access.

Membership Dues

It was suggested and discussed to raise the dues for members who prefer to receive the newsletter by mail. It was decided this was not a good idea. Insurance

The value of our library has been estimated as high as \$100,000. The Museum carries insurance on the building but not on our contents. We've come up with a quote of \$500 per year for damage insurance (not the whole 100K). The board doesn't feel the library has this much intrinsic value to us where our members would want to pay another \$5 per year—it is more than our book budget the board is looking for suggestions, comments, or ideas.

A good place to start is the 1900-30 census records as a column was included showing the year of immigration etc. Cyndi's List has 17 pages under *Immigration and Ship Passenger Lists Research Guide*. Some other sites: Ancestory.com a paid site (Ancestry is available for no charge at the FHC, Philomath, and Corvallis Libraries), EllisIsland.com, CastleGarden.org, Archives.gov, Rootsweb.com, Olivetreegenealogy.com, and look at Canada crossings as many came straight through Canada.
