The BCGS maintains a library of some 3,000 genealogically specific books in the Museum Annex (Whelchel Building) adjacent to and west of the Museum open every Tuesday 12:30 to 3 pm and after the meetings on Saturday. South Dakota historical Society offers fourth-grade census project

"South Dakota historical Society offers fourth-grade census project," was the headline of one article in the September 21, 2008, Minot Daily New, Minot, North Dakota, picked up while on Amtrak returning from vacation. Submitted, Lee Smith

Our society has taken on the indexing of the Benton county 1910 School Census with initial statistics reported on pages 58-60 (More in later issues.) Our members are transcribing students' names, birth month and year, and their parents' names, a rather dry and narrow scope of statistics. But even that may be just the details a genealogist of the future may be seeking. The South Dakota project is a recurring effort (4th annual this year) in Pierre, SD fourth-grade classes. It is a little different than the information requested on a federal census form or the minimal details with which TCGS is working. Their project teaches the students how a census is taken, the fact that certain types of data may be collected, the importance of collecting and especially for genealogists and historians. They are asked to answer 20 children-oriented questions, all of which is coordinated by the SD State Archives.

Typical compiled results from last year's census with 1,112 fourth-grade students participating:

- * 60% said they play a musical instrument.
- * 67% said they had been to Mount Rushmore Nation Memorial.
- * 47% have a dog.
- * 23% have a cat.
- * 28% said Math was their favorite subject (the top choice.)
- * 25% said Gym was their favorite subject (second place choice.)
- * When they grow up, 12% wanted to be a football player (most popular).* When they grow up, 10% wanted to be a veterinarian (next).
 - * When they grow up, 8% wanted to be a teacher.

This is a GREAT idea as a future project for a local community or genealogy society.

The newspaper index covers the period from 1995 to the present. Some newspapers for the period 1990-1995 are also included in the index. Click on the link to access the search page. Enter a keyword or two in the search box. The data fields in the search results include result number, subject 1, subject 2, name, title, newspaper abbreviation, date on which the article appeared, and the page number.

The Siskiyou County Obituary Index

The obituary index covers the period from 1854 to 1991. Click on the link to access the search box. The data fields in the search results include result number, full name of the deceased, newspaper title, and date on which the obituary appeared.

The Siskiyou Pioneer Index

This database is a searchable index of the Siskiyou Historical Society's annual Siskiyou Pioneer Yearbooks. The data fields in the search results include result number, title, and date

Identifying United State War Veterans in your Genealogy

The following are the steps you will need to paste US Veteran grave Markers to your genealogy.

- 1) Using your computer under "My Picture" creates a folder for "Grave Marker" or whatever you want it to call it.
- 2) On you Internet browser enter "US Veterans Grave Markers". Several sites will come up; the one I prefer is **www.martinsflag.com**, and there are lots of others to choose from.
- 3) At Martin's site click on "War Veteran Grave Marker". They have a marker for all of the wars and conflicts that the United States have been involved in.
- 4) Find the marker of your choice and highlight it. "You just click next to the marker and swipe across it and that mark will turn blue".
- 5) Right click on that blue marker and select "Save picture as". Select the new folder you just made, you can label the marker or leave the ID that Martin flag put on it. Just make sure you are saving it as a jpg.
- 6) Save the markers as individual pictures rather than saving the whole group, it will make it easier to insert into your genealogy later. Because I have uploaded my file to Ancestry.com I can put these markers under the photo of the appropriate individual along with other photos of them.

Election of New Officers

The BCGS Board discussed and decided at the 30 October 2007 Board meeting that it would be a good idea to have co-officers for some of our positions. Although we have an active membership, our members are active in other pursuits as well. Others are overwhelmed at taking on the task of being an officer. Being a co-officer gives members a chance to help our organization as well as have time for other activates such as families, vacations, trips, and emergencies.

All positions are up for nominations. As outlined in the Benton County Genealogical Society By-laws—Duties of Officers and the duties of some positions up for election are as follows:

Co-Second Vice-President shall preside at the meeting in the absence of the President and the First Vice-President; to act as Hospitality Chairperson and be responsible for the refreshments at each meeting.

Co-Secretary shall keep accurate minutes of all meetings of the Society **and/or** Board meetings; to make a report of the Society minutes at each meeting; and to handle all communications deemed necessary.

Library Assistant/Staffing will make sure there is someone to man the library every Tuesday and to assist the Librarian as needed. *Note: This position is appointed by the President and is not one of the Officer positions.

Newsletter Assistant is needed to type articles and information for the Newsletter Editor to place in newsletter layout.

According to the **BCGS By-Laws**, a nominating committee of three is appointed by the President at the **September** meeting. Nominees shall be presented and nominations opened from the floor at the **October** meeting. Election of officers shall be held at the **November** meeting.

Installation of officers shall take place at the December meeting of the same year.

BENTON COUNTY GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY NEWSPAPER PROJECT UPDATE

Our Benton County Newspaper project is nearly complete; however, we still need a volunteer to adopt the last microfilm reel. Over the last 15 years or so, many Benton County Genealogical Society members have participated in reading the newspapers on microfilm and recording the data. Several active members continue to work diligently on this service project.

Anyone researching individuals who lived in Benton County between 1865 to July of 1925 may find information in our Benton County Genealogical Society Newspaper surname index online. Births, deaths, obituaries, marriages, legal references, and other items of interest such as family reunions are cited with a code beside the persons surname along with the date and name of the newspaper where the information may be found. One of our volunteers or any researcher may use the surname index to quickly locate the newspaper articles on microfilm.

"GENEALOGICAL DECEPTION" IN: GENEALOGICAL JOURNAL, VOL 19(1,2), 1991

Some background: Danell Aukerman pointed out this issue to me and suggested it might be of interest to BCGS members, even though it is not "brand new." There are six articles in this issue, which is available in the BCGS Library.

The first article, "Unraveling Balls of Yarn," concerns some dubious records about two men named William Ball. Finding a line already researched can be good -- or bad, if the records have been "helped" by previous researchers. The Balls in question have become entwined. This article points out how critical it is to <u>reason</u> while reading and to not accept "any published statement at face value."

The second article, "Estate Fraud and Spurious Pedigrees," deals with attempts to qualify for "a rightful share in an estate by creating fanciful forebears and false lines of descent." Examples of several well-known frauds are given, which make for good reading!

The next two articles elaborate on a famous fabricator, Gustave Anjou, who did research for large sums and manufactured creative pedigrees for his clients. He took some well documented data and mixed it with invented connections. The Family History Library in Salt Lake City has at least 109 "genealogies" done by Anjou. You may want to see if any of your families are among them. Gustave Anjou's obituary included this statement: "Traced Humble to Great from \$9,000 for pedigrees of the wealthy, he cut rate to \$250 for Smiths, etc." He did more than invent pedigrees, he invented himself. He was actually born in Sweden, took his wife's name (Anjou) and claimed he was born in France. After serving prison time in Sweden for forgery he came to the U.S. and became a "genealogist."
