
Preserving Your Family's Treasures Thursday, January 17 12:00-1:00 p.m. PST

Statewide birth certificates

are now available at the Oregon State Archives (OSA) for the first time, but only for the year 1916 as birth records are restricted for 100 years from the date of birth. They are sent from the Oregon Health Authority (OHA) in Portland to the OSA.

Using Life-Event Timelines

Ancestor's Name

Date	Age	Life Event	Source	World/ U.S. events

Creating a timeline while you're researching is a simple way to understand an ancestor's life. Once you've built a timeline with the sources you already have, you're able to see what else you want to know.

As an example, I wanted to know more about my mother's life before I started putting together her story. Mom and Dad often talked about meeting each other on a train. I knew that Mom was on her way from Iowa to join her mother in Hailey, Idaho, but I was never sure why my dad was on the train. As we all usually regret, we kids didn't ask enough questions.

However, by using timelines I had made for Mom, Dad, Mom's mother, and her mother's husband, I was able to pin down the time frame of their life events that contributed to Mom and Dad's paths crossing. I used censuses, city directories, Mom's diaries, dated photos, documents, letters and newspapers to reach my goal.

The timelines can be simple with three columns: date; life event; and source. The one above adds another column for the person's age as well as one for major world/U.S. events. There are lots of timelines online, but I want something simple that I know I will use.


Timelines can be used for research and then as a guide for writing an ancestor's life story. If writing hundreds of words isn't your thing, you could add photos or other memorabilia to each event. That would make a wonderful and graphic look at a life. I've decided if I don't get all the writing done that I want to, the next generation might know their ancestors' lives in a shortened version through my timelines. Who knows, the timelines may be the spark to make another genealogist in the family!

World War 1 Newspaper Clippings-1914-to-1926 Available Online

Quoting from the Library of Congress web site:



"The massive collection, World War History: Newspaper Clippings, 1914 to 1926, is now fully digitized and freely available on the Library of Congress website. The 79,621 pages are packed with war-related front pages, illustrated feature articles, editorial cartoons, and more. You can search by keywords, browse the content chronologically, and download pages.

"Coverage begins on June 29, 1914 with articles focusing on the assassination of Archduke Franz Ferdinand of Austria and continues into the post-war world through Dec. 31, 1926. The clippings provide a tremendous resource for the examination of the devastating Great War and its aftermath. The chronological arrangement of daily press coverage from multiple sources is invaluable."
