Indexing New Era papers – This is a very intense project, it is slow as it involves a lot of reading. The volunteers doing this are doing a great job and learning a lot of history.


Family files – Putting the obits and information from the file cabinets into notebooks is a slow project but is making headway.



More About Our Speakers in March and the Presentations They are Giving, Other Important News




Janice M. Sellers is a professional genealogist who is passionate about her work. She specializes in Jewish, black, dual citizenship, and newspaper research. She has taught at local to national/international events. Her Web site is ancestraldiscoveries.com.

Presentation 1- Where There's a Will: Probate Records Can Prove Family Connections

Class Description: Records created when a person dies can be very useful for genealogists, as they often describe family relationships, but there are pitfalls also. This class will cover estate records and also touch on guardianship records.

Presentation 2 - Read All about It!: Using Online Newspapers for Genealogical Research

Newspapers are valuable in genealogical research because you can find information about births, marriages, deaths, moves, business, naturalizations, court cases, and more. Millions of pages of the world's newspapers are now accessible online, but there is no one place to find them all. This class gives an overview of what is available online and techniques to help improve your chances of finding information about your relatives.



David E. Larsen, I was raised on a small dairy farm in Myrtle Point, Oregon. After a couple of years of college I joined the Army and served 4 years in the Army Security Agency, 1965 - 1969. I serviced on the Korean DMZ and on the East German border. After the Army, I returned to college and graduated from Oregon State University in 1971 with a

Zoology degree and the Colorado State University in 1975 with a Doctor of Veterinary Medicine degree. I practiced in Enumclaw, Washington for a short time and then we moved to Sweet Home in June of 1976. I ran Sweet Home Veterinary Clinic for just over 40 years.

I am married to Sandra Larsen and we have 4 kids (all adults now) Brenda, Amy, Dee and Derek. We have 9 grandchildren. Now we enjoy retirement with some travel, Genealogy and some continuing education in Oregon History and I do some memoir writing.

Presentation 1: Finding Sam

This program is a chronological sketch of my nearly 50 year search for my grandfather and his family. He was a Norwegian Sea Captain who salted lumber ships on the Oregon and California coast at the turn of the century.

Presentation 2: The Story Continues

This program demonstrates researching in Norway. I will show how to do an online search in Norway's census records and Parish records. I will conclude with a brief discussion of using DNA in research, had I not found my grandfather before DNA became available I would have found him when it was available. I will also offer a <u>tremendous</u> short cut for people doing research in Norway.



I have over 30 years personal genealogy research experience. Before retiring from my corporate career, I spent over 25 years as a director of information technology, a software developer, project manager and technical writer.

After retiring I spent ten years working for our local veterinarian.

I graduated from Boston University with a Certificate in Genealogical Research, and have taken many continuing education classes concerning genealogical research.

I am a member of the National Genealogy Society, the Seattle Genealogy Society, Daughters of American Revolution, Families in British India Society, and the Genealogical Forum of Oregon.

I am the owner of Rainshadow Genealogy, and I provide research services for Family History research, DNA analysis, probate and heir search, forensic genealogy (including adoption research), record retrieval, genealogical organization, and Czech Archives research. I adhere to the Genealogy Standards and Ethics set forth by the Board of Certification of Genealogists.

Creating Source Citations (Power Point) 1-1/2 hours Eliminate duplication of research effort, organize your research time, provide others (and yourself!) with exact information on where you found (and did not find) source documentation. Creating source citations helps you to document concise answers to your research questions. There will be time for questions during the presentation and after.

Using Ancestry for Effective Research (Power Point and LIVE Demo)

1 hour Using Ancestry.com's search capabilities can be overwhelming. Learn about making the most of your research time by creating focused research questions, using a Research Log, and watch a live demo of how to 'drill down' your Ancestry searches to make searching more effective. There will be time for questions and answers during and after the presentation.



Lebanon/ Albany and Santiam Canals
Presentation by Chet Houser

This presentation will follow the general monthly meeting which gathers from 10:00 to 11:00 a.m.. The public is welcome and encouraged to attend this free presentation, and all are more than welcome to come early and see what the general meeting is about. Coffee, tea, and snacks will be provided.

Chet Houser has been a trainer in one form or another for over 40 years, working for 20 years in the US Army, 20 years for the State of Oregon and most recently as a Docent in the Monteith House. He lives in Albany with his wife of 48 years. He and his wife have lived in Albany over 46 years and they have traveled all over the world.

Chet is currently the President of the Monteith Historical Society. The society's mission is to preserve the Monteith House, the oldest house in the city of Albany, and to preserve and share the pioneer story. The Monteith's were co-founders of Albany, and the society supports the historical preservation of houses and buildings in Albany.

Chet's presentation will focus on the three different canals that served Lebanon and Albany, starting in 1871. When did each canal get created, how dependent were the surrounding communities on them, and did the Chinese really dig them? What impact did floods have on the valley and the canals? What happened to the first freight ship (it had a cute name, anyone know it?) brought up river to Lebanon? Everyone knows the Albany Canal proved to be too swift to take freight up stream, so was it ever used for moving products to market economically? What economic impact did the canals have on the local communities? How did Sweet Home and cutting a viable road over the mountains to Bend figure in this story? What caused the demise of the canal system and meant Albany lost its strategic advantage over other communities in 1889?



In Josephine's presentation, **DNA - Truths and Myths Exposed**, you will find out how DNA can take your genealogical search to the next level and is it right for you.


