Program Review for September 14, 2019

Gathering Back Together

Bringing together our society members after the summer hiatus to share their stories is always gratifying. Who has more stories to tell than a genealogist? This year's program seemed particularly rewarding with

so many members eager to reconnect with other like-minded BCGS people. At least 32 individuals, including a new member, attended the September program to share stories of multiple events in their lives over the last few months or more.

Some told family stories of the past, some recent past and some distant past, and people and places they visited. Others told of future planned trips connecting with "new" cousins never before known. Visits with family to identify photos and DNA matches resulted in genealogical successes. A few attended conferences



gleaning information helpful to their research. From welcome surprise gifts to reconnecting with friends at school and family reunions or taking their own photos of archival records to hiring professional genealogists were among the many events related. Computer problems were given attention with helpful suggestions offered by members. Notebooks of photos and memorabilia were passed around for all to see the variety of ways genealogy can be recorded and shared. Still other members generously worked on genealogy projects for others.

Humorous stories about finding strange occupations listed on a census added levity such as "superannuated." (It's listed in my spell checker.) A serious topic made us think about who will take



care of our genealogy when we are gone. Keeping a form with your will designating who is going to inherit your genealogical materials was suggested. See page 4 in this newsletter: "My Genealogical Will for Preserving My Family History."

Most of all, continue writing and researching your never-ending story. Write stories of your life or an ancestor's life. Pass on your stories to the next generation with Grand Camps consisting of Grandparents and Grandchildren coming together to tell family stories as was suggested at the meeting. Record your family history in whatever way makes the best

sense for you and your family.

Genealogical Codicil to My Last Will and Testament:

To my spouse, children and/or heirs, guardians, administrator or executor:

Upon my death, it is requested that you DO NOT dispose of any or all of my genealogical records, including those prepared personally by me and those prepared by others, which may be in my possession. This includes, but is not limited to, books, paper and or computer files, notebooks, correspondence, audio/visual items, photographs, and documents, for a period of two years

During this two-year period, please attempt to identify one or more persons who would be willing to take custody of said materials and the responsibility of maintaining and continuing the family histories.

BCGS Highlights of the Year—September 1, 2018 through August 31, 2019

Financial Report

Net Loss (\$330) This is partly due to two major purchases, a new sign for the library and for meetings and the purchase of a new projector to use for our programs. Most years we've had a surplus. There is money in the account to cover this year's loss. Bank Balance at August 31, 2019: \$5,810

Officer Changes: 2 significant changes this year made life much easier for board members: Ann Bateman became newsletter editor, which eased George's workload, and Debbi White is now our secretary, which allows Linda Olsen to devote her time to providing us with excellent programs.
