Beth grew up in Connecticut knowing from childhood that her father was a descendant of Francis Cooke, one of the Mayflower passengers. She has not only verified her lineage to Francis Cooke but also found family lines to Elder William and Mary Brewster, Stephen Hopkins and his wife Elizabeth Fisher Hopkins, Thomas Rogers, Henry Samson, and Richard Warren. She has 11 lines approved through the General Society of Mayflower Descendants (GSMD) in Plymouth. She is also a member of the Brewster Society, The Francis Cooke Society, the Pilgrim Stephen Hopkins Society, the Pilgrim Henry Samson Kindred, and has served on the Board of the Thomas Rogers Society. Currently, she is the Governor of the Oregon Society of Mayflower Descendants.

For her program, Beth will be dressed as Mary Brewster, probably the oldest woman (in her 50's) to travel on the Mayflower..

BCGS Library News

We recently received an interesting Family History book titled Our Davis Pioneer Ancestors by Edward



Davis and David Davis. The authors do a good job of integrating family genealogy with the story of David and Hannah Davis's travel to the Willamette Valley from Iowa in 1847. They and their eight children settled in the Soap Creek and Tampico area north of Corvallis. Two well-researched chapters cover the histories of Soap Creek and Tampico and some of the people who lived there. There are lots of family photos and a number of maps as well. Other chapters tell the stories of the Davis families who moved away from Soap Creek in the 1860's.

Soap Creek is where a fearless and persistant woman named Letitia Carson lived. She was a free African American woman who came to

Oregon with her Irish husband in 1844 and was the subject of the novel *A Light in the Wilderness* by author Jane Kirkpatrick. The author gave a lecture on Letitia Carson for the society a while ago.

Even if you don't have any Davis ancestors, I think you'll find this book provides an interesting picture of early settlement in the Willamette Valley and other places in Oregon through the lives of one family. You can drive through history by taking Tampico Road across from the northern end of Adair Village to where the road intersects with Soap Creek Road. The Tampico townsite is near that intersection. You'll find a large stone with a plaque to the right side of Tampico Road. You then turn left onto Soap Creek Road. As you drive down the road, you'll see the historic Soap Creek school on the left side. Just enjoy the beauty of the area and imagine yourself as a pioneer starting from scratch. When you come to the end of Soap Creek Road, turn left to go back to Corvallis.



December Auction and Potluck

On Saturday, December 14th, about 20 of us gathered in the Museum's Moreland Gallery, amid the

amazing art work of Rip Cronk, and had our second annual silent auction. The back of the gallery accommodated several tables where we spread the donated items, and we used additional space on the stage. We had a brief business meeting, then the frenzied bidding began... okay it was really calm and relaxed. After about an hour time was called, one table at a time and the highest bidders claimed their items and paid the cashier.





A few statistics:

• We raised \$313 compared to last year's total of \$427, so we didn't do as well this year.

- We had 16 donors who provided items.
- 15 people bid on and purchased items, often more than one.
- 39 items were sold.
- 22 items had multiple bids.

Items with the most bids (6) were

- A wooden tray, perhaps teak
- A box of Panera pastries
- Kathryn Moss's pumpkin rolls, 2 of them and each with 6 bids

The highest bids were all for \$15: Soup mix set, Holiday wreath, A huge basket of children's toys, and a Wine and cheese basket



After the auction, we all went over for the potluck in the Annex and lingered and talked and ate.
