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What is an Heirloom?

What is the heirloom that you will share on Zoom with your BGS friends on Tuesday, December 15? Webster defines *heirloom* as a valued family possession that is handed down from generation to

generation. Heirlooms be any shape or size, or made of any type of material, precious metals to a scrap of paper. To start you thinking about an heirloom to share in December, Brad Lemmon wrote this story:

"I'm not sure if this picture has been in my family for enough generations to be considered an heirloom, but I think of it that way.

It was created by my maternal grandfather, Harry Heiss, leading up to Christmas 1965 while he had leukemia and was too sick to work. Harry was reputed to be a gifted artist, and drew quite a bit when he was young. Unfortunately, this is the only piece of art that survived his mother's dislike of clutter. It is about 3 feet tall and made out of glitter glued to white felt. To preserve it, my father added a frame around 1968."

Thomas MacEntee is a genealogy educator and author with over 42 years of experience researching his family history. His mother shared this wisdom with him: *"You can't hold on to anything in this life – knowledge, memories, family photos – with a tight grip. Thomas' website is aptly named <u>Abundant Genealogy</u>. The site is filled with free resources and articles. He freely gives just as his mother taught him. Thomas' other site is <u>Genealogy Bargains</u>, and again it is full of bargains and free stuff. He has redesigned his Genealogy Cheat Sheets. Ethnicity results (more aptly called geographic origins) have been updated by three of the largest DNA testing companies—AncestryDNA, 23andMe, and FamilyTreeDNA. Gilad Japhet, CEO of MyHeritage, announced on June 23, that an ethnicity update is coming for MyHeritageDNA. To Gary Putnam and Sandy Thompson, the 23andMe update seems to match the geographic origins in our paper trees better than the updates from AncestryDNA and FamilyTreeDNA.

The geographic origins part of DNA test results is certainly very popular with consumers, but the results are still variable between the companies. What did you think about your updated ethnicity results?



Momondo, a European travel fare metasearch company, asked 67 people from all over the world to take a DNA test. The company then produced a video, which shows some individuals' thoughts about their ethnicity before taking the test and when the ethnicity results were revealed to them. It is interesting and only about 5 minutes long.

Watch <u>The DNA Journey</u> on YouTube. It illustrates why ethnicity results are popular, and that maybe DNA testing can even unite the world. Following the introductory video, there are several other videos that show more footage of the individuals featured in the short 5 minute one. This was an intriguing idea.



The WWI Centennial Commission and the Doughboy Foundation continue to produce high quality webinars about WWI topics, in addition to update videos about the construction of the WWI Memorial. *Finding Your WWI Ancestors* is a terrific genealogy workshop that will benefit every genealogist searching for WWI ancestors. There is also

a FREE 100-page research guide book that goes with it.

Vintage cookbooks are one of the resources that she covers. I wish the pictures weren't quite so big on her website, but the content between the pictures is good.

Another cooking-themed article (Lisa has a sweet tooth): <u>A Baker's Dozen of Free Genealogy Websites!</u> <u>Are You Missing These?</u> Everyone knows FamilySearch is free, so it's not on this baker's dozen list. Lisa's list is eclectic and there are a couple that I'm definitely going to check out. How about you?

Dia de los Muertos Celebrating Our Dearly Departed on Nov. 1-2

Learn more about this annual celebration of life from Anna Melendez Johnson. Though Anna lives in Arizona now, she has never forgotten her time in Bend, when she worked for Deschutes County from 2002 to 2015. She also served on the Deschutes County Historical Society (DCHS) Board of Directors (2006-2015).

Join Anna in a video presentation to discover the true meaning behind the traditions of Dia de los Muertos, a vibrant and colorful Latin American celebration of loved ones who are no longer with us that honors their contribution to who we are today. It is a reunion between the living and those no longer with us.

In the 15-minute video, Anna will discuss:

- What the symbolism is around the Dia de los Muertos regalia and makeup.
- How the festival is celebrated around the world and in the United States.
- The history of this life celebration and ways that you can participate.
