# Kith and Kin By Charlene Talbot Emergence of a Genealogist: Ted Gump

"I had always been interested in the name Gump," Ted Gump said. "Then when I was called up to active duty in the service in 1951 at the time of the Korean War my dad and I spent a few days together at Long Beach, Washington, and I had a chance to ask him about the family. He started talking, and I started writing it down. That was the beginning. I went off to the war, and afterwards LaRea and I were living at Grants Pass. I was teaching some classes for the Army Reserve at the University of Nevada. All the students were officers. My wife had asked me before I left for Nevada to see if I could find out anything about her great grandfather had served in the Civil War from Missouri. Then one day a student came to see me in my room and when he found out what I was looking for, set me on the right path."

Shortly after that, at the library in Reno, Nevada, Ted found information about his 3rd great grandfather Gump, and was hooked. "Does anybody go to Reno to go to the library?" he asked in an aside. But his wife was also interested in genealogy, so they began working together to find their roots. They joined the Benton County Genealogical Society while it was still meeting at the Corvallis library.

Ted's first find was pretty exciting, he recalls. He discovered that Frederick Gump, his first Gump ancestor in this country, came from Germany about 1749. Frederick's mother died on the way over, and his father died shortly after their arrival. It appears that Frederick was apprenticed to a weaver. Ted knows that Frederick later served in the military. However, the first time he filed for a pension in Indiana he was rejected. Some time after that in Pennsylvania he received a state military pension. Then the Federal law was changed and he got a Federal pension.

Ted has put together all the information he has gleaned so far -- and the doubts -- into an 18-page booklet which he has called *Frederick Gump's Journey*.

Ted has been in touch with other Gump family researchers, and had just downloaded 145 pages of research the other day. "That researcher had me as my brother's father," he remarked. "You have to be careful what you put out there," he says. "Restrict the information you give out to what you're darn sure of."

Ted's ancestors on his mother's side were among the

Oregon pioneers of 1853. He found his great grandfather, David Carns, on the 1850 census of California, and realized he'd been a '49er.

"He made enough money that he came home on a ship to Panama, crossed the Isthmus, and took a ship on the other side," Ted said. "He got home in 1852 to find his brother William and family were getting ready to leave for Oregon. So in 1853 John got married to Hanna Murphy in the adjoining county and they set forth for Oregon, too."

Ted has been to the Mormon Library in Salt Lake quite a few times. He has lots of areas to work on, but he wants to solve the Gump puzzle first. He says the work never ends. He has gone to all the places in Pennsylvania, Kentucky, Ohio and Indiana where he believes the Gumps lived, and to the local cemeteries. He has also been to the DAR Library and the National Archives in Washington, D.C. and made several trips to Europe.

"Every trip we visit a cemetery or two, either of my ancestor's or my wife's," he told us. "I have all kinds of people in Delaware and Maryland, Virginia and West Virginia.

"You can just go crazy," he added. "You never know when you're going to come up with some information. One day at my cousin's in Portland she had a box of old glass plate photos she wanted to give me. I found a letter among them about my Gump family of Green County, Pennsylvania, including the names of the Gump women who were married before 1850 and their husbands."

Another surprise several year ago was when he received a letter from a woman related to his Everly line, in Kentucky, which she had received from kin in Fayette County, Pennsylvania on her Davis line. That list showed that a Thomas Davis had had a daughter who had married Ted's Everly ancestor. That led back to Holland and to England.

His advice to other genealogists is not jump to conclusions. If there are any questions, find out for sure, and be careful about taking other people's stuff for granted.

**CASHIER/SALESPERSON** - Need two persons for the Society table to log the books sold, take money, give out receipts and answer questions.


**HOSTESS (AT LARGE)** - Two people are needed to assist Margaret Hays with answering questions, directing or walking with visitors to the BCGS library.

#### **Past Times**

Only 100 years ago in 1902, America was a very different place, a place our great-grandparents experienced. The average life expectancy was 47. The average was 22 cents an hour, and the average worker made between \$200 and \$400 annually. Only 14% of homes had a bathtub. There were only 144 miles of paved roads and only 8,000 cars. More (95%) births took place in the home and 90% of doctors had no college education. The five leading cause s of death were pneumonia, influenza, TB, diarrhea and heart disease. Most women washed their hair once a month and used borax or egg yolks for shampoo. There were only 230 reported murder s in the entire country.


