Book Looks By charlene talbot

This useful book, A Bibliography of American County Histories, compiled by P. William Filby, is in our Genealogical Society library under US. The Corvallis-Benton County Library has it only as a reference book, so it is particularly satisfying that our members are able to check it out and take it home to use at our convenience.

The next step when you find your county of interest is to see about obtaining the volumes through inter-library loan. So far, we're happy to report, we have been able to obtain any volume we requested. Sometimes we've had to go to the Corvallis library to look at a particular book, and sometimes we've been able to have it sent to the Philomath branch library, check it out, and take it home. Once or twice, with very rare copies of county histories, we have been sent only the index and from there have been able to obtain the pages that we thought might be relevant.

The reason we are familiar with this bibliography is that we have a Revolutionary ancestor named John Wortman who was a Loyalist. He and his family went to Canada with the Spring Fleet of 1783. The list of his children and their birth dates has come down in our family, but nothing about his birthplace or the date. A John Wortman is listed in the book on New Jersey Loyalists, but no county is given! There appear to have been at least five men named John Wortman scattered about New Jersey at that time. (We've finally settled on Monmouth County. All the other John Wortmans were still there after the Revolution ended.)

Getting back to county histories, a magazine article we read recently said that one should be sure to look at all the histories written for the county of interest, if there is more than one, because they're not all the same. One may just have that scrap of information you need.

Besides county histories, the Bibliography lists regional books, such as, for instance, under New York State, the History of the Valley of the Hudson, or, under Virginia, Shenandoah Valley Pioneers and Their Descendants.

This Bibliography gives the author, and name and date of the publisher--in fact, all the information the inter-library loan form asks for.

Some years ago we were able to straighten out the descendants of one of our great uncles (which wife bore which children) by looking at one of those 1890's vanity publications for

PHILOMATH NEWS, 1883

The elopement of Elmer Bethers and Miss Laura Porter from near Philomath about ten days ago, and of which mention was made in the GAZETTE last week, has been permanently settled. The young couple took a southeasterly direction from here and arrived at Roseberg after a two days' journey, where they sought protection under the strong arm of the law and were united in holy bonds of matrimony by the Rev. John Howard of that place. The happy couple spent the night together at the hotel and expected to return to their old haunts near Philomath the next day and settle down to enjoy the stern realities of connubial bliss, but on a telegram received by Sheriff Perdom they were both arrested and the young man escorted to other quarters, the guest of Douglas county, while the young lady was persuaded to sleep alone at the hotel. They were returned by the proper authorities to the "home of their childhood" and young Bethers gave bail to appear and answer the charge arrested for. On last Tuesday the accused appeared at the place appointed, assisted by proper counsel, to defend himself, but as the prosecuting witness failed to appear young Bethers was discharged. We understand that the young husband and wife have settled down to enjoy the real blessing of wedded life, and although their launch has been rough and ragged, it is to be hoped that their troubles are over and that they may skim across the matrimonial sea with a favorable wind always blowing in the right direction.


