Book Looks

When Your Ox Is in The Ditch, Genealogical How-to Letters by Vera McDowell

If you enjoy reading about how to do genealogy, this paperback is 158 pages of good entertainment. The foreword says that the title, When Your Ox Is in The Ditch, has its roots in the Bible (Luke 14:5, Which of you, having a donkey or an ox that has fallen into a pit, will not immediately pull him out on the Sabbath day?) It is an old expression often used in the South to convey a thought common to anyone who has ever gone down the research road: a condition where one is in dire need of help from someone, anyone, to move things forward!

The book is in the form of letters of advice to a friend. They first appeared in the Augusta, Georgia, Genealogical Society's monthly newsletter, *Southern Echoes*, in July, 1982.

Interestingly (to us anyway), when we read the book for the second time, with this review in mind, we realized that we had corresponded with the lady. We had placed an item in a Maine newspaper about our Wortman family, and one of the Wortman girls had married a man named Adonijah Munson. Vera McDowell was tracking the Munsons of Maine. Our exchange of letters took her one step farther on the research road. And she took us a lot of steps further. She tipped us to the fact that just because my ancestor John Wortman's children were all listed in the Eastport, Maine, town records didn't necessarily mean they had all been born in Eastport. Thanks to her we believe he may have been a Loyalist and went from New Jersey to New Brunswick, Canada, with his wife and first four children on the Spring Fleet of 1783.

Her how-to letters were written before computer researching had taken over. Actually, we don't think computers are mentioned. But her advice is good, whether you're following a computer program or not.

We're recomending this book on the theory that even when a person knows all about how to do research, there are things we forget. Look for it on our How-To shelf.

Corvallis Newspapers Project Update

For those new members who aren't familiar with our Society's Corvallis Newspapers Project, and for everyone in general, here's an update:

After some searching of memories of long-time members, it was concluded that the project was begun in the late 1980's. Ed Stratton remembers that the Society had finished the Benton County Cemeteries project and was looking for something new to take on. About that time the Gazette-Times gave the Benton County Museum all their old microfilm reels, along with a cabinet to keep them in. The Society decided to index the early births and deaths reported, from 1865 to 1926. The names of the newspapers changed throughout the years, and included The Corvallis Gazette 1865-1909, The Corvallis Times 1894-1898, The Oregon Union 1897-1899, The Daily Gazette Times 1910-1922, The Weekly Gazette Times 1907-1920, The Corvallis Times, The Benton Democrat, and The Corvallis Gazette Times 1922-1926.

It was thought at the time the project would was begun that it would take about ten years. As it now stands the Index has about 8,627 names, and there are several reels that have not yet been adopted, as well as several unfinished reels.

When contacted, Mary Gallagher at the Benton County Museum said, "Oh, yes, the index gets used several times a week. Today I had a woman come in who was looking for her family. She used the index and she was thrilled."

Mary went on to say, "A couple of weeks ago a man came in off the street. He was on his way to Alsea. He had a marriage date, but when he looked his family up in the index, he discovered that the couple had had a big write-up on the front page of the paper. They had both been teachers at the college here. After their marriage the groom had taken up a post at Alsea. The point is that without the index we wouldn't have known about the front-page story. It's so easy to look in the index. It has been much appreciated. If the people who come to the museum are doing genealogy, the index gets used."

The index gives deaths, births, marriages, divorces, legals and other. "Other" may be a fiftieth wedding anniversary or a letter home from a young man in World War One, or anything the abstracter thinks significant. Each year an addendum of about a thousand names is being added. A copy goes to the Benton County Museum, the Corvallis main library and the Society's library.

The list of names also goes on Benton County's GenWeb page. Lee Gentemann is the Society's webmaster. We urge you to take a look at it and be impressed.

There is no way of knowing how often the copies of the index at the Corvallis library or the Society's library get referred to, or the list on the GenWeb site.

Ancestry Quick Tip Yellow Plastic Helps Make Copies More Legible

If you are making a copy and the original seems too light to read, simply place a sheet of yellow Mylar down on the glass, then put your original over that and continue the copying process. (Mylar can be purchased in most officesupply stores.) No other color but yellow will do the trick. This has proven invaluable through the years in copying receipts and other information that were almost too hard to read.

Newspaper Holdings Available on Merlin

The Missouri Society's extensive newspaper collection is now included on the University of Missouri's MERLIN Library Catalog. Researchers interested in determining whether or not the Society has newspapers from a particular county or town or a specific newspaper title can access the online catalog at http://laurel.lso.missouri.edu/ and click on University of Missouri-Columbia Libraries. Newspaper holdings can be found by title or by searching for a county or town name under Keyword. The Missouri Society staff is currently working on the entries so researchers can locate the papers under the Journal, Magazine, and Newspaper Titles heading; newspapers in counties beginning with the letters A-C are now available under this heading. The catalog entries include previous titles, succeeding titles, and information about the Society's holdings of each newspaper. 

BCGS Library Inventory

Each year the BCGS inventories its library research holdings to determine which of our documents are not accounted for, and to identify errors or how we can improve our published shelf list. The inventory this year was conducted July 27th. Sincerest *THANKS* to those who assisted with the inventory, namely: Damaris Reynolds, Jean Grube, Betty Swan, Betty Brummett, Mabelle Martsching, Julie Bielman, David Kribs, Tonya Rawie and Bill Gleaves. The list, which will be published in the next newsletter, shows which volumes could not be located. All of you who have checked out BCGS library items **PLEASE**, **PLEASE** double check your genealogical material to see if any of the missing items have ended up in YOUR library. If so, we'd appreciate your returning these at your earliest convenience.

Of our total inventory of approximately 2300 volumes about 50 items could not be located. That constitutes roughly 2% of our documents which by normal library standards is well within the acceptable range for inventories. Nevertheless, we need to continue to carefully adhere to our established "Check-in, Check-out" procedures to keep future "unaccounted-for" items to a minimum.
