Book Looks By charlene talbot

This is going to be a review of the VCR tapes that the Society owns and are available to watch in the comfort of your home.

Probably the best of the how-to tapes are the Genealogists Video Research Guide series, Parts I through VII. Each tape lasts an hour. They were made at the Mormon Genealogical Library at Salt Lake and we considered them very well done. They are entertaining to watch, even if you already know it all. Each one deals with a different subject. Part I is pretty elementary. Part II covers census and probate records, and so on through Part VII. That last one covers the National Archives and its suggestions sound difficult to follow up. There are now better ways of using your research time.

Do Your Family Tree is a two-part series by Dr. Arlene Eakle. The first one is 50 minutes long. The second takes 75 minutes. As you can tell by the title, it's another how-to.

Ron Bremer's seminar of November, 1989 was taped at the Corvallis Senior Center by Ed Stratton, who was then the Society's president. We thought we recognized several current members, looking ten years younger. Bremer suggests a number of different approaches, which are as good today as they were then. He gave another seminar a few years later in Philomath, which was also taped, but seems to have disappeared. We have his big, red COMPENDIUM book in our library as one of our reference books. (It's too heavy to take home for a good read!)

A Visit to Ellis Island is a walking tour by the National Parks Service. It's interesting, but contains no genealogical suggestions. Another tape called Ellis Island consists of three one-hour segments with commercials. These tapes are both out-dated by the new listings on the Internet of people who came to this county via Ellis Island at the time when it was the arrival point.

Orphan Train, a 52-minute video tape made by Oregon Public Broadcasting tells briefly at the beginning about the discovery of a closet-full of records of the Children's Aid Society of New York City and then goes on to interview several people who were brought west shortly after the first World War. Watching it at home, we felt the people interviewed complained more than they should have, because

certainly the idea of taking these homeless city children to the west was a good one. Two of the resettled orphans became governors--of North Dakota and Alaska.

Members of the society who attended this year's January meeting got to see the first half of Cemetery and Funeral Home Records, by Leland K. Metzler, Heritage Quest Productions. The first part dealt with how to find the records. In the second part Metzler tells how to make gravestone rubbings and how to photograph gravestones. It is our impression that gravestone rubbings are not as popular as they were.

To sum up, any of these videos will make an interesting evening's watching.

Cemetery and Funeral Home Records

Cemeteries, only mothers and grandmothers are a better source. Anything might be wrong; however what can be better source information? There they are—the record chiseled in stone.

5 types of Cemeteries

- 1. Commercial Memorial Parks Not likely to use as they haven't been around too long.
- 2. Municipal Cemeteries- County, State, National mostly likely place genealogists will be looking around.
- 3. Church Cemeteries- find the church records, at the church, town hall, Church Repositories.
- 4. Fraternal Cemeteries Common burial sites late 1800's early 1900's records may be at local lodges, city hall, or individual cemeteries.
- 5. **Family Cemeteries** find the deed location, look on USGS County maps, ask an old timer, at times the present owner doesn't even know that there is a cemetery there.

The **Sexton** is the one to find concerning municipal cemetery records. (I've found that many cemeteries are either owned or maintained by the local mortuaries.)

Death Certificate, Burial Permit, Funeral Homes, Cemetery indexes, are other sources for information. Information on one can often give further family information lacking on another.

When looking in the cemetery—record all the information on the grave marker—record who is buried around them—look for other relatives, names of interest (in-laws) in the cemetery.

Contact area funeral homes. The ones out of business are usually taken over by current ones. Our society's library has an older copy of the yellow book, only ours is named *THE RED BOOK!* It's large and bright red—located on the front references shelves near the annex door.



NEWS FROM THE LIBRARY

There have been several comments from BCGS members regarding the large number of books that could not be found during our annual inventory last July. The list was published in the newsletter last month. Fifty five volumes were identified as "unaccounted-for," requiring more detailed searching to locate them, or to determine the reason they were not found during the inventory. Further probing revealed that of the 55 volumes listed:

- 18 have been missing for more than two years, some for four years, but these were never dropped from the shelf list.
- 5 were sold or discarded, but not removed from the shelf list.
- 4 have been checked out (long overdue), but borrowers claim they don't have them, or have not responded to reminders. These will probably end up on the "missing" list.
- 8 have been returned or found since the unaccounted-for list was published.

That leaves 20 volumes that "disappeared" in 2004, which is less than one percent of the Library's inventory, which is well within the usually acceptable library standards. The search continues for these missing 20 volumes, as well as any others that may be recovered. For example, in every inventory during the past four years, several unaccounted-for volumes have been found before the next inventory took place.

GERMANY RESEARCHERS--ACHTUNG!

Members, Gene Newcomb and Ken Bielman, have recently donated two of a series of books that <u>may be</u> valuable to those of you researching your German ancestry. The earliest vital records in what is now Germany were recorded in parish church books. Civil registration started about 1800, and all states included vital statistics in civil records by 1876. Many churches continued to record family data within the parish even though civil registration had begun. Frequently, researchers must search the records of the church that the family of interest was affiliated with as the civil records are not available or are incomplete. In those cases locating the proper church or parish is an essential element of the search.

The new books, each covering a German State (or political division), identify towns and villages by the parishes with which they are associated. Locating the correct parish is frequently a dilemma for German ancestry researchers, and these books can be very helpful in solving this problem. The church districts are classified as to Catholic, Lutheran and "other" faiths. We invite you to examine one of these books to see if this type of resource would be helpful to you in your search.

The two books now in the library cover Baden and Wurtemburg. If anyone is interested in obtaining a book covering a 0different German political division, the Book Committee has offered to pay half the cost if the member will pay the other half. The cost of each book is about \$32.
