#### NIMROD Submitted by Janice Barclay

A book of interest to local history lovers has just been published. Many of us have heard of Nimrod O'Kelly, called the first murderer in Benton County, but it has always seemed an unfinished story. Now, Ronald B. Lansing, a professor of Law from Lewis and Clark College in Portland, has done a thorough job of research and written Nimrod's story from the time the murder was committed, through the several efforts to hang him on the street of what was then called Marysville to his final punishment. The book named "NIMROD, Courts, Claims, and Killing on the Oregon Frontier" has recently been published by and may be purchased from Washington State University Press, PO Box 645910, Pullman WN 99164-5910. Their phone number: 800 354-7360. The story not only tells the incredible murder story but includes the names of other early settlers who were involved in the affair. It also details the valiant effort that Nimrod made to retain ownership of the mile square of land he had homesteaded and which was the cause of the murder.

## Book Looks BOOK LOOKS

On our US shelf the Society has the two-volume set of A SURVEY OF AMERICAN CHURCH RECORDS, by E. Kay Kirkham, Researcher in American Genealogy. Under the title it says "...for the period before the Civil War...East of the Missippi River. But actually under the listing of states, we found brief write-ups about Missouri and Minnesota and notes on the available church records in these states.

Aside from that quibble, we have found these books very useful. Volume One deals with the major denominations and Volume Two with the minor ones. At the back of Volume One the abbreviations are listed. Many of the records are available on tape from the Mormon Church library in Salt Lake, and can be sent for at our local Family History Center in Corvallis.

Out of curiosity to see if we could get it, and because we had reason to believe that the ancestor we're searching for in ShrewsburyTownship, Monmouth County, New Jersey, might have been a Baptist, we requested through interlibrary loan a copy of the book, Seventh Day Baptists in West Virginia, which was listed under Monmouth County. We got it! It seems these few families settled first in Monmouth County, N.J., before they went to West Virginia. (Unfortunately we didn't find our ancestor among the list of their members.) The Second Volume explains who the Seventh Day Baptists were.

Elsewhere the writer says: "The immigrants to this country, both early and late, came here primarily for religious freedom--and land. In the old country they were denied ownership of land generally, but they were dependent upon their churches for the recording of the vital records of their lives. Their way of life was centered upon the religious activities. Thus we should not be surprised if in this country the immigrant people made exceptional efforts to establish churches in the wilderness and by custom, recorded the events of their lives upon the books of their church."

As genealogists this is something we should not forget. People came to this country to establish their particular religion. As we learned in school, Roger Williams was tossed out of Congregationalist Massachusetts because of his religion (Baptist) and founded Rhode Island. Then later Rhode Island outlawed the Quakers.

We found the section on religious migrations of particular interest. "In colonial times," the writer says, "and of course later on, religious affiliation was a serious matter.... Actually, religious freedom for the individual was not achieved throughout the United States until some years after the Revolutionary War. Massachusetts in 1833 was the last of the states, or commonwealths, to disestablish its state religion."

These volumes are well worth looking through, whether you know to what religion your ancestors belonged, or are hoping to discover that fact.



#### Heritage Quest URL

OK, just as promised, here is the URL for Heritage Quest, where you can see the actual census microfilms on-line. I forgot to mention that Heritage Quest has PERSI (index of over 1.6 million genealogy and local history articles) AND Revolutionary War Pension and Bounty-land Warrant application files - the microfilms of the originals, not just an index.

One thing I ask in return is that if you have found one or more internet sites that have really helped you with your research, (or might help someone else) that you send me the URL so that I can include it in the April class that I'm going to do for the society. Even if you think -"Oh, Danell probably already knows about this site", send it along anyway. The only ones that I hope EVERYONE already knows about and that you don't have to send to me are Rootsweb, FamilySearch, and Cyndislist.

Researching British Genealogy

Our own Bill Gleaves presented the January program on English research as he has made two trips to England and recently attended a seminar about research in England and Wales at the Family History Library in Salt Lake City. Early records, we learned, were kept in the parish chest: land, property, taxes, occupations and poorhouse. The church wardens kept track of who came to church and paid their tithes, and the wardens were in charge of the repair fund.

Researchers are urged to visit the county records office, if possible, as local people are the ones who know what records exist. There may be emigration records, too, as people needed permission to leave. Had they paid their taxes, for instance.

Records are often dated by the reign of the king or queen, and a chart of the dates may be needed.

After they stopped writing in Latin, the vicars used Old English script. Booklets for the old writing are available and an on-line tutorial exists.

Bill says he will be happy to help anyone who needs more explicit information.
