Emergence of Two Genealogists: Dennis and Peggy Haney

"I have a cousin who lives up in Clatskanie who has been researching our father's Davis family genealogy," Peggy Haney said when we asked her what started her interest in genealogy. "She asked me to research some records at the courthouse in Corvallis. Our great grandfather had come from Virginia with his family and settled in Benton County in the early 1900's. I found I liked doing research. My mother and aunt had never met either of their grandparents and knew very little about their relatives. While my Aunt Stella is still living I decided to research her family genealogy and provide her with information about our Chisamores and McAndrews. But I find myself branching out to my dad's side from time to time."

Dennis Haney said, "I have a cousin who was working on my dad's side, but I didn't know anything about my mother's line. I ask myself from time to time, 'why am I doing this?' The answer is that I'm just curious, I suppose. I had a long list of things I wanted to do when I retired, but genealogy is addictive."

Dennis and Peggy got interested in their forebears about the same time. They took a class on beginning genealogy at the Senior Center from Danell Auckerman, (our current president). Dennis and Peggy were both born in Eugene. Neither of them had met any of their family beyond their living grandparents. Dennis's parents met when they attended high school in Cottage Grove, but *their* parents had come from Nebraska. Peggy's forebears, the Chisamores and McAndrews, came from Ontario and Quebec and then immigrated to Wisconsin.

"It's a challenge, getting things out of Canada," she said, but she has been able to contact quite a few cousins via internet. "I like being in touch with live cousins," she said. "They're scattered all over the U.S. and Canada."

Dennis and Peggy are looking forward to attending a reunion of Chisamores in Wisconsin in June. Peggy was the one who organized it. She'll be able to meet some of her contacts face to face, including some of the Canadians.

The Haneys are members of the Cottage Grove Genealogical Society as well as ours. Dennis said, "They have a nice big house there and one of the things they have is a file with obituaries of Cottage Grove people, and other pieces of information. I found a hand-written note there from a woman in Arizona who was looking for information about my family." Dennis spends a lot of time on genealogy, three hours a day at an estimate.

"My mother and my grandmother and my greatgrandmother were all collectors," he says. "I guess I'm probably a collector, too." He was checking some cartons that had been taken from his parents' house and found a whole box full of letters dating back to the early 1900s. The letters explained some brick walls. "Thank goodness, they didn't get sold, or just tossed," he added.

Peggy said, "I spend a lot of time making contacts by e-mail and telephone. I'm really into collecting family pictures and newspaper articles which I have used in the three genealogical scrapbooks I've assembled. I made one for my aunt in Lake Oswego for her ninetieth birthday and she loved it. I keep contacting more and more people who are sharing photos.

It's Dennis's job to make the entries into their genealogy program.

They say they've also sharpened their interest in history. Dennis finds that he has ancestors who came to this country much further back than he had any idea. "I don't like to take people's word for things," he stated. "So I've got an itenerary to go and look at the sites myself."

The Haneys take their RV and try to stay on back roads. They don't go very fast. They feel they have had lots of luck and have met nice people. They bought a lap-top computer just for their genealogy records. It bothers Dennis when he has names but no dates and places to go with them. They also take one of their grandchildren on their trips when possible. "Hopefully generating an interest in history and their background," Dennis remarked. Peggy has had her granddaughters down at the library helping her look for obituaries.

They've also taken further classes on genealogy. Their most recent class was on using a digital camera.

Dennis's advice is to follow all your leads and don't give up. Be persistent. Also, have a good filing system. "But probably the most important thing," he added, "is that family stories that get taken for fact may not be right."

# Bill Lewis Resigns as Benton County Historical Society and Museum Director

Bill Lewis, Executive Director of the Benton County Historical Society and Museum, has announced that he will be leaving his position at the end of June.

Bill has been director of the museum since 1983. While *Director*, he saw the "growth of the museum program, the completion of the renovation of the Philomath College building and the development of the plan to move the Horner Museum's collection to downtown Corvallis." Bill served as the President of the Oregon Museums Association for four years and has participated in numerous community organizations and activities.

BCHS Board President, Alice Rampton, said "Bill Lewis has been invaluable to the development of the Benton County Historical Museum and the efforts to find a home for the Horner Collection. He has served our community for over two decades and we owe a debt of gratitude for his vision and contributions."

During his years as director, the museum has grown, flourished, and has gained prestige throughout Oregon. Bill stated that he has "worked on the Horner Project - saving the collections of the former OSU Horner Museum - for more than eight years. The Horner Collection is too important to our community, our state, and the nation to be lost." The Horner Museum collection has over 60,000 artifacts and will be housed at the new museum location (the former Copeland Lumber Company building) on the corner of Second and Adams Streets in Corvallis.

Tom Wogaman, former Historical Society Board President, will serve as interim director until a new director is found.
