By Charlene Talbot Emergence of a Genealogist: Cecilia Anderson

Cecilia Anderson said, "I became active in researching genealogy in California. There was a time there when adult education courses were being offered practically free. Also the LDS Church in Santa Clara had tremendous outreach, and they gave classes. They had very good people there as teachers. One woman was a native of Germany. So I got off to a good start. My sister-in-law was also interested. My mother said to me, 'I didn't tell her everything, but I'll tell you."

Two sides of Cecilia's paternal line came from the same village in Germany to San Francisco at different times. They met and married in San Francisco. Her maternal line is from France and Austria.

"A boatload of people, some 300, left this German village to go to Australia," she says, "at the time of the Australian gold rush in the 1850's. There was no way of making money in the village. They would go to England or the U.S. for a time and then go back home. Of the boatload who went to Australia, some families stayed, some went home, and some went to California. My great grandfather Knipper went with his parents on this boat and after a few years they returned to the village in Germany, disliking Australia. By this time my great grandfather was an adult and came to California according to the record, 'with a bunch of men.' The Hildebrands came to San Francisco about 1859. They took a ship to Panama, walked across the isthmus, and got a ship up the other side."

She went on to say that in the 1700's in this particular village, 30 miles north of Frankfurt, the rector of the village took the records home and his house burned. So her research on those lines came to a screeching halt.

Cecilia usually goes to the Family History Center in Corvallis once a week and spends three hours looking at films and chatting with other people. "You learn a lot from what they're doing," she says. "Then some time when you're doing dishes or something that leaves your mind free, you think, Why didn't I do that! Actually, my ancestors are pretty dull. My husband has a horsethief in his family, and some other colorful characters."

She uses her evening hours to work at the computer. She also paints and belongs to a quilting group. Her husband told her when they were first married that as long as she had

dinner on the table, and he had a clean shirt in the drawer, her time was her own. She has completed the reading of two microfilms for the Society's Benton County Newspapers Project.

She has also put her research into book form and had photocopies made for members of her family. She thinks the maps she put in are important. There are also photographs, of course. She has helped her husband with his research and he has a book, too, ready to publish except for some final work he is doing on the photographs.

She enjoys helping other people with their genealogy problems, and has learned to do research in Swedish, Portuguese, French and German. She tried to do Finnish, but gave it up as just too difficult. She has helped various inlaws. One daughter-in-law's family was Portuguese, from the Azores. "That was a different kind of research," she says, "and I learned something from that."

She tells a story about a friend who volunteers at the Vina Moses center. In a box of contributed stuff this friend found a Bible from the Noe and Smith families. Cecilia took a couple of hours at the computer and found the Noe family. They said the Smiths should have it, and forwarded Cecilia's e-mail. She learned that the Bible's owner, Lloyd Smith, was here in Corvallis in a nursing home. His mother had given him the Bible years ago. The upshot was that his son came down from Kent, Washington, and was extremely appreciative to get it.

"That was very satisfying," Cecilia says, "and it didn't take long."

She complains that she is just about out of research things to do. "I haven't done the studying needed for a certificate as a genealogist," she told us. "I have found that many people don't want to accept things, and you can't tell them, 'Well, here's the record. You're wrong!"

She thinks genealogy is the best mystery story. Her advice to other genealogists is to take notes and keep a record of all that you do.


