The Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) has enhanced its online index to the Genealogical Records Committee Reports — the name for its collection of genealogical information from family Bibles, tombstones, church records and the like. ## Book Looks By charlene talbot

The title of this month's choice for review is typical of the book itself. It is called Historical Collections of the State of New Jersey; Containing a General Collection of the Most Interesting Facts, Traditions, Biographical Sketches, Anecdotes, Etc. Relating to Its History and Antiquities, with Geographical Descriptions of Every Township in the State. This brownish paperback is a reprint of the original, which was published in 1846. The fine print contains a lot of material, and no index of names. But if you have an ancestor in New Jersey, or just enjoy reading history, the book is well worthwhile.

As the authors say in the preface, "The history of New Jersey is one of deep interest. Some of the most important events of the American Revolution occurred upon her soil. In that arduous struggle, the sacrifices she had will ever redound to her praise; and for her treatment of the aborigines she shall receive still higher praise. In the language of one of her favorite sons, 'It is a proud fact in her history, that every foot of her soil has been obtained from the Indians by fair and voluntary purchase and transfer--a fact that no other state in the union, not even the land which bears the name of Penn, can boast of."

The Historical Collections contain a list of townships, cities, and villages; an index of sorts; and a list of biographical sketches, notices, and epitahs. Each county and township has a write-up.

Since the book contains a great many stories about the Revolution, we were naturally drawn to read about the Battle of Trenton. There were three accounts of the battle. At the time of the writing of this book, 1846, there were still people alive whose parents or grandparents had participated in the war.

While writing this review, we got interested in the Battle of Assunpink The writer says: "It has been a matter of surprise to many, that the Battle of Assunpink, or Trenton bridge, should be passed over so lightly by most historians of the revolution. On the result of this action ... was suspended the fate of American independence." The book claims, "the following account of the battle of Assunpink is given as related by an eye-witness, and published in the Princeton Whig, Nov. 4th, 1842." The main trouble with this book is that the accounts are mostly set in 8-point type, and are therefore hard to read.

#### National Genealogical Society Manuscript Collection Transferred to the DAR Library

According to Eric G. Grundset, Library Director at the DAR Library in Washington, DC, the manuscript collection of the U.S. National Genealogical Society's library was transferred to the DAR Library in late March 2004. The collection filled approximately 150 boxes of genealogical materials. The Society did retain some manuscript material for further study or for other reasons.

The National Genealogical Society offered the material to the DAR Library in order to reduce its own storage space requirements.

#### REMEMBRANCES

#### CECILIA L. ANDERSON

#### AUGUST 19, 1928 - FEBRUARY 11, 2006. SHE WAS 77.

Cecilia was born in San Francisco to Albert and Gisella (Forthoffer) Knipper. She grew up in San Francisco and attended University of California at Berkeley. She held administrative positions at various companies in San Francisco before marrying.

On November 17, 1956, she married Roy Anderson, her husband for 49 years. They had two sons, Carl and Richard. In August 1967 the family moved to Mendocino City, Calif., where Cecilia also worked as the bookkeeper at the Mendocino Art Center. She left the Art Center to be a full-time homemaker in 1972.

In 1975 the family moved to Sunnyvale,, Calif., and lived in Sunnyvale for 18 years. During those years Cecilia developed an interest in pastel drawing and watercolor painting, which she would continue to pursue the rest of her life. Cecilia continued her education at De Anza College and receiver her Associate of Arts degree in 1982. She also became interested in genealogy. She researched the family histories for the Knippers and the Andersons.

In 1993, with the boys grown up, Cecilia and Roy retired to Corvallis. In Corvallis, Cecilia was an active member of Quilts for Caring Hands, where she became known as an expert in quilt tying. She was also active in the Benton County Genealogical Society. In recent years Cecilia and Roy were able to enjoy traveling to many countries and destinations around the world.

She is survived by her husband Roy, her sons Carl of Union City, Calif., and Richard of Mountain View, Calif., and two granddaughters.

Interment will be in California.
