Lewis & Clark Presentation — Lois Meessen April 9, 2005

After Lois Meessen read the book From Sea to Shining Sea, by James Alexander Thom, she became so interested in the Lewis & Clark expedition that she traveled the trail they followed, as much as is possible today. She traveled the trail and camped. She said, among many other interesting facts, that books exist about various members of the expedition, tracing their descendants up to the present. The Lewis & Clark College in Portland has a wonderful collection of books about the expedition. President Jefferson referred to it as Lewis's "tour." Meessen talked about the varied travels of Sacajawea's son, Jean Baptiste, and has visited his grave near Jordan Valley in southeast Oregon.

Book Looks By charlene talbot

<u>Plymouth Colony Its History & People 1620-1691</u> by Eugene Aubrey Stratton, FASG, Former Historian General of the General Society of Mayflower Descendants.

This history of the Plymouth Bay colony reads more like a research paper than a book you might want to sit down with for an enjoyable session during a spare hour. The back cover says it is the first comprehensive guide to Plymouth Colony. It is not a volume our book committee chose to buy but was a gift to the Society. Even the chapter headed Morality and Sex is not as interesting as one expects it to be.

However, if you have any descendants from that era, the section called Part Three: Biographical Sketches is certainly worthwhile. It contains a wonderful list of names as well as sources for more information about the people listed. We didn't count the number of names, but the biographical sketches cover almost 150 pages.

The book's appendices are worthwhile, too. One of them is a copy of the Mayflower Compact, by which the male settlers of the colony agreed to be governed by the will of the majority. This is generally considered our first American example of pure democracy.

Another interesting point made by the author is that "...having no royal governor, and being composed of all the freemen, the Plymouth General Court was as free as conceivable in making, changing, and interpreting the law."

Last Thanksgiving the news magazine supplement to the Gazette-Times, USA Weekend, showed a photograph on the front of a white man, an Oriental woman, and an African-American boy, all of whom could count Mayflower passengers in their ancestry. One of the article's headlines said that probably a hundred and sixty million Americans could count the Mayflower passengers in their descendency.

In the foreward to the book another genealogist says, "Stratton first covers the seven decades of the existence of the colony in the usual chronological presentation, but with emphasis on the arrival of settlers, both from Holland and England, and also on the movement of those settlers once they had arrived in New England."

The book is published by Ancestry Publishing in Salt Lake, Utah.

12 November 2005 - ? Wagon Trains East (coming west through eastern Oregon that is).


This event has proven fun for many of us as the way we make our annual contribution to the Society Book Fund as well as picking up some Christmas presents for the grandkids.

The Civil War Soldiers and Sailors System is a computerized database containing the very basic facts about servicemen who served on both sides during the Civil War. The Civil War Soldiers and Sailors System (CWSS) is a cooperative effort by the National Park Service (NPS) and several other public and private partners. This site is fairly easy to use and search.
