A Trip Through New York City in 1911 is an 8-minute film, which was taken by the Swedish company Svenska Biografteatern on a trip to America. The film has been around for a few years, but this version has enhanced image resolution, and is colorized by DeOldify (company which licensed its technology to MyHeritage for photo enhancement and colorization). Plus, the speed was boosted to 60 frames per second. It is a lot of fun to watch on YouTube: Click here. The streets are filled with horses, streetcars, early automobiles, and lots of people walking wherever they want to on the streets.

An article written in 2018 has some pictures from today to compare to scenes in the film. Many of the buildings are the same, but there aren't any horses competing with cars and streetcars in the modern

pictures. There are far fewer people walking on the streets in today's pictures, too. The article has a link to the same film in black and white that you can compare to the colorized version. Click here for the article.

Places to Find Royalty-Free Images for Your Family History Projects.

Sometimes you just don't have enough family pictures to include in your stories. Devon Lee (FHF) posted a 12-minute Facebook video (FREE) to help us find images to enhance family history projects. She explains the difference between copyright free (public domain) and royalty free images. She also gives us a simple citation template to use, if a citation is needed.

She demonstrates <u>Pixabay</u> (royalty free) and <u>Wikimedia Commons</u> (copyright free), but the show notes list more websites to use than the two in the video. <u>Click here</u> to read the show notes post on the FHF website, where you can copy the citation template, if needed, and find the longer list of image websites to try.

the search fields. After a search you'll be able to hide Obits or Marriage results (if there are any), if desired.

Notice on the results list, US State locations can be refined by County Name. If you are searching in Canada, the results are refined by province, in Australia, by cities, in Ireland by county, and in the United Kingdom by country.



Also note, Newspapers.com has two subscription

levels now: 1. Basic (201M+ pages of mostly historical papers) and 2. Publisher Extra (Basic plus 473M+ additional pages, which includes more recent papers licensed from publishers than the Basic level.
