

The letters are often routine, telling of camp life and battles, discussing politics and situations at home, expressing the soldiers' hopes and fears....mostly their anxieties were for the safety and well-being of their loved ones. Despite their weariness of war, an optimistic thread is woven throughout that their sacrifices would eventually culminate in Southern independence; they kept the faith.

Library Access during COVID

Options for Access:

Visit when open. The library will be **open** <u>once a month</u> on the second Saturday beginning in January. The hours will be from 1-3 p. m. [January 8th, February 12th, etc.]

Make an appointment. Contact Lois Courtney (<u>loiscourtney@cmug.com</u> or cell 541 -760 – 0405.) Let us know how many of you will come and how much time you might need. Hours for appointments are Wednesday, Friday and Saturday from 10 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

Request a book to pick-up. Select a book from our online inventory (http://www.bcgs-oregon.org/library/library-shelf-list) Contact Lois Courtney (email loiscourtney@cmug.com or cell 541 – 760 – 0405) with your request and plan to pick it up on the 2nd Saturday of the month between 1 and 3 p.m. If the book is not available we will notify you.

For an in-person visit please confirm your vaccination status and **plan to wear a mask inside the library**. We will have masks available if you don't have one.

By the Way-How Did Our Book Collection Get Started?

Since we're celebrating **50 Years** of Benton County Genealogical Society's existence, it's nice to find out how our book shelves became full.

[from the 25th year history of BCGS written by Virginia Hoeye in 1996.] "The Mid-Valley Genealogical Society bought books.* They owned none when they organized. By December 1972, the group purchased and donated four books, while the Library acquired an additional eight. A dozen more publications were donated to the collection that year. Acquisition of books increased so that in 1974 Susan Taylor's report showed 209 genealogical books on the shelves and 13 periodicals in the Library. In May 1986, 297 genealogical books and periodicals were listed in the Society's Library Catalog Card List. The 1990 book list numbered 411, and the September 1995 shelf list tallied 1322."

*Mid-Valley Genealogical Society was BCGS's first name It was begun by a group of people from several counties.

Today we have around 3000 books, many of which are not online. There's nothing better than a book in your hand filled with information you have been seeking!

Calling All Genealogists and Your Ancestors!

How many of us have ancestors who were in the Civil War,- Union or Confederate? If you have someone, please share what you know: maybe a photo, letters, or even just a name and where they lived.

I found several of my Kentucky Winkler ancestors on Ancestry: "1890 Veterans Schedules of the U.S. Federal Census." Corporal Lewis M. Winkler was the son of my second great grandfather, Andrew Jackson Winkler. He was discharged because of "disease of lungs."

The other ancestor, Private Bethel Winkler, was the son of my third greatgrandfather Lewis Davis Winkler. There are a few more that I am still working on.

The information on this Schedule is: name, rank, company, regiment, date of enlistment, date of discharge, length of service and sometimes why they were discharged.

In Family Search: I could only find "United States Census of Union Veterans and Widows of the Civil War, 1890." I found Bethel but not Lewis M. in this Schedule.

If anyone knows more about Family Search and the Civil War, I hope you'll let me know and we can post it in this newsletter. I'm looking forward to hearing from you and anything you might know about your Civil War ancestors.




