The BGS Find a Grave Project

Facilitated by Brad Lemmon and Sue Dolezal

Pilot Bute and Greenwood Cemeteries are side by side at the base of Pilot Butte in Bend. Pilot Butte is an historic cemetery as it was established in 1913. Greenwood Cemetery was opened over 75 years ago. Both of these cemeteries are open to burials today and are on Find a Grave.



A look-up request BGS received a few weeks ago asked us if we could determine if a name entry in a Find a Grave memorial in Pilot Butte could be



wrong, because the date of death looked accurate for someone else. After research, we were able to prove the entry was a mistake and initiated a correction. The young wife buried in 1922 is now remembered by cousins, who had been hunting for her for some time. Since then, BGS has discovered that several memorials in both cemeteries do not have an active manager. We have setup a BGS Find a Grave account and adopted the orphan memorials, so they will have a manager.

We are starting a Find a Grave project to correct any other entries and take pictures of headstones as needed. We live here and can walk the cemetery, matching burials and headstones to Find a Grave entries. Accuracy is what makes Find a Grave helpful to genealogists worldwide, otherwise mistakes are multiplied in trees worldwide, or an ancestor's


resting place is never found and their story is not complete for their descendants.

Join Brad Lemmon and Sue Dolezal at the Pilot Butte/Greenwood complex and enjoy exploring the cemeteries. Walking in a cemetery can be a special experience imaging the stories of those who have passed.

The co-located cemeteries are found just south of Pilot Butte (see map below). Brad and Sue will provide a page of objectives and instructions. All you need to do is show up wearing good walking shoes. If you have a favorite camera, clipboard, pen, grass clippers or soft brush, it might be helpful to bring those, too. How long you can stay is up to you.



The main purpose of the project is to improve information in Find a Grave, which could include taking missing gravestone photos, verifying/correcting memorial entries and possibly adding new memorials. We may do very minor clean-up, especially to improve a picture of the stone.

There are three entrances to the cemeteries marked with **E**.

- 1. 12th and Hawthorne
- 2. 10th and DeKalb
- 3. Bear Creek Road

Even though this map doesn't show it, all three entrance roads connect to a network of narrow roads inside the cemeteries. There is some parking where it says **Park**, but it is also possible to park on 10th or 12th Street and walk into the cemeteries. We will meet at the large mausoleum building (**Meet** on the map).

DNA Workshop Presented by Gary Putnam Thursday. April 14 at 10:00 AM on Zoom (free)

GEDmatch is not a DNA testing company like *AncestryDNA or MyHeritageDNA*. It is an online service that analyzes user-submitted autosomal

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DNA data from different testing companies, such as *Ancestry, MyHeritage, and 23andMe*, etc.

Gary has been utilizing *GEDmatch* to analyze DNA matches. In this workshop, he will demonstrate the various tools on the site that he uses regularly to make advances in his family history.

Gary is the BGS President and has researched his family for over 60 years. He's published his research and stories in eight books. His father's lines go back to colonial times, including the Mayflower. His mother's family has taken him to Greece and Crete to research in village archives.

Stories from Rancho de Santa Manuela, Arroyo Grande, California

Rancho de Santa Manuela was established near San Luis Obispo, CA, on thousands of acres of undeveloped Mexican-granted land by Susan's 3x great-grandparents. It was quite an adventure for the young family who reached their new land on horseback in the 1800s.

In this presentation, you'll hear stories that Susan has collected in her research of the time of large ranchos in the Spanish-Mexican era in California's history. The stories include celebrations that lasted for days to a time of drought. Susan has traced her family all the way back to her 7x great-grandfather Lt. Juan Jose Carrillo de Albornoz born in 1689 in Baja, CA, a leatherback soldier who traveled with the Gaspar de Portola expedition, which included Father Junipero Serra, too.

TIDBITS FROM THE WEB



New York City Historical Vital Records. The New York City Municipal Archives released 9.3 million birth, death and marriage records. The high-quality scans of the records can be downloaded and are FREE. Date ranges are: birth (1866-1909), death (1862-1948) and marriage (1866-1949). The goal is 13.3M records, so there are more to

come. <u>Click here for the NYC Vital Records website</u>. You can browse the records, or search them by type, number, NYC borough, or year on the home page. To search by name, click **Search** beta at the top of the home page. Scroll down to find the "By Name" search. I quickly found the scanned marriage record of my Aunt Bernie's parents in 1912. Reviewing original records is much better than only seeing an index record on Ancestry.

The New York City Municipal Archives has more digital record sets than the above Historical Vital Records collection. The site is worth exploring. Perhaps browsing the <u>Almshouse Ledger collection</u> could be interesting to you. <u>Here's a finding guide for the Almshouse Ledgers</u>.

Congregational Church Records Online. "The Congregational Library & Archives launches free digital archives containing a treasure trove of important New England historical records" is the headline of a <u>post on their website on 24 Mar 2022</u> describing the new digital archives. There are records from over 100 New England churches in 90 different communities in this new archive and most date from between 1634 and 1850. There are over 170 collections that


contain servmos, vital church records, church disciplinary records, minister diaries, and more. <u>Click here for the new Congregational digital archive</u>. There are guides for new users. Handwritten records are transcribed for you, too. If you are researching in New England, maybe a record in this archive will be just the one you need.



How Do You Search a Name? GenealogyBank, as well the other newspaper sites, offer lots of help for successfully searching newspapers. <u>Gena Philibert-</u>

<u>Ortega's article</u> on 4 Feb 2022 focuses on searching for names and steps you through several different ways, especially for searching for women's names.

A Simple Trick to Find Misspelled Names. Sometimes misspelled entries prevent us from finding records in online databases. Using wildcards in your searches might help. In a 5-minute video by Amy Johnson Crow, you'll learn what wildcards are and how to use them to uncover misspelled or misindexed entries on Ancestry.com.



Check the Help section for wildcard rules on other sites you like using. Wildcards are a common feature for searching genealogy databases, and when using internet browsers, including for Google, Firefox and others.

CENSUS TIDBITS FROM THE WEB

A re you searching the 1950 Census already? If you have found a records your ancestors, drop us an email and tell us about it-info@bendgenealogy.org. We'll print 1950 stories in the May newsletter.

- Find the 1950 census at the National Archives with OCR index at: https://1950census.archives.gov/
- It will take a month or two before seeing indexed census records on the big genealogy sites. Until then, the enumeration district (ED) for an address is needed to determine which record set to browse.
- 1950 Census Enumerator Instructions Always helpful to know the instructions enumerators were given.
- <u>Stephen Morse's One-Step site</u> for obtaining applicable ED numbers.
- Ancestry has a 1950 Census Map finder (beta) to use for finding ED numbers.
- YouTube tutorial by Amy Johnson Crow for the Ancestry's 1950 Census Map Finder.
- Ancestry has 1950 census images available now for browsing.
- MyHeritage has 1950 census images available now for browsing.
- This list of which site has what is changing daily, so check your favorite genealogy site for updates.

FamilySearch 1950 Census Community Project. The indexing project is underway now. Volunteers are ensuring that information indexed by computers is



complete and accurate. You can volunteer to help. <u>Click here to learn about volunteering to be an indexer</u>. There is a genealogical society indexing project, too. Census Bureau: COVID drove largest spike in U.S. deaths in a


century, post by Axios news 23 Mar 2022. <u>This news report</u> summarizes Census Bureau data about the impact of the pandemic in the United States. It drove the

largest spike of deaths in a century with 535,000 more deaths in 2020 than in 2019. In addition to the sad fact of so many deaths, movement in our population was detected. Mega, pricey population areas, such as New York-Newark or LA-Long Beach, experienced a net domestic migration decrease. People fled expensive cities for the sanctuary of less populous (and cheaper) areas. The Census Bureau does more than just conduct the decennial census.
