Correcting a Find a Grave Memorial

On a cold, but sunny, early January Sunday afternoon, I received an intriguing email from Sandy. BGS had received a query asking about a Find a Grave memorial at Pilot Butte Cemetery. A fellow genealogist from Arizona was hunting for a grave photo and information about the grave of a cousin who died in 1922. She couldn't find the young woman on Find A Grave, but she did find a memorial with the correct last name, birth year and

date of death, but with the wrong first name. She asked if we could check it out at the cemetery and determine if the memorial was really her cousin or was not. Knowing my husband and I work with Find a Grave memorials in Harney County, as well as extensively with our own family memorials, Sandy sent me a quick email with the details thinking I might like an adventure.

Here is the query, as submitted: "In the Pilot Butte Cemetery on the Find a Grave, there is a grave for Jason Lawson; Born 1905; died 30 Mar 1922. There is no photo of the headstone, if there is one. Could this possibly be Josie Lawson? Where would I go to verify the record? Thank you."



Sandy had very quickly found a Certificate of Death for Josie Lawson and a Return of Marriage from Wasco County (see p. 2). Josie, 17, and her new husband, John, had been married less than 60 days before she passed away from Peritonitis in Bend and buried at Pilot Butte by C.P. Niswonger, Undertaker, Bend, Oregon.

The original Find a Grave memorial was created in 2008 from information provided by the Bend Genealogical Society, according to the Find a Grave entry. We didn't recognize the name of the memorial creator, but we do have a Pilot Butte Cemetery notebook in the Library and would have had an older version in 2008 that listed all the graves at that time. The memorial creators probably used the notebook from the BGS Library to create the Lawson memorial, as well as many others in the Pilot Butte Cemetery.

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We needed to see what was at the cemetery, before deciding the memorial had an error. My husband, Gary, and I were out of the house within 30 minutes of receiving Sandy's email, and headed to Pilot Butte Cemetery to do some sleuthing!

In the book of burials at the Pilot Butte Cemetery, the name, Jessie Lawson was listed with same plot number, which is in the current notebook in the Library, too. Gary and I searched the entire section thoroughly and did not find a headstone, which is not uncommon. We have no idea how the original errors occurred. We're guessing original handwriting for the plot information was not clear and a transcriber at some point saw Jessie instead of Josie. Did a 2008 list have Jason, or did the memorial creators introduce that error?

Where the error came from makes no difference today. I corrected the information

on Find a Grave with the memorial managers. Jason/Jessie Lawson is now correctly listed on Find a Grave as Josie Lawson.

The originator of the query was grateful for the information Sandy was able to provide to her and she provided BGS with a nice donation for our efforts.

Stories from Rancho de Santa Manuela, Arroyo Grande, California

Presentation by Susan Agli, Past BGS President, member of the DAR and Society of California Pioneers

Rancho de Santa Manuela was established near San Luis Obispo, CA, on thousands of acres of undeveloped Mexican-granted land by Susan's 3x great-grandparents. It was quite an adventure for the young family who reached their new land on horse-back in the 1800s.

In this presentation, you'll hear stories that Susan has collected in her research of the time of large ranchos in the Spanish-Mexican era in California's history. The stories include celebrations that lasted for days to a time of drought. Susan has traced her family all the way back to her 7x great-grandfather Lt. Juan Jose Carrillo de Albornoz born in 1689 in Baja, CA, a leatherback soldier who traveled with the

Gaspar de Portola expedition, which included Father Junipero Serra, too.

🌕 Utah Digital Newspapers

The Salt Lake Tribune collection has grown and is at

your fingertips. The Utah Digital Newspaper site has a powerful

search engine. It recently finished dgitizing issues of the Salt Lake Tribune from 1920 to 2004 (1.6 million pages). They have been added to the existing collection of issues from 1871 to 1919. <u>Click here for Utah Digital Newspapers</u>. If you have Utah ancestors, this newspaper site may help you break through a brick wall. Many of the state sites are regularly adding more digitized pages to their sites, too. Return to your favorite states every few months to see if new papers have been added

Ancestor Hunt has one of the most extensive lists of links to free newspaper sites in all 50 states and Puerto Rico, the Canadian provinces, and special U.S. newspaper collections, such

as German, Japanese, Italian, Nordic, and Labor and Union papers, among many others. <u>Click here for the</u> <u>Ancestor Hunt Newspaper Links page</u>. Scroll down and start exploring the newspaper categories that would be interesting to you. **HINT:** There are more links on the site than just the digital newspaper links. There are <u>Quick</u> <u>Reference Sheets</u> and 20+ categories of <u>links to other free online collections</u>, such as yearbooks, and criminal, coroner, voter, immigration and tax records.

Are You Searching the 1950 census? The release of the census generated lots of question. Amy Johnson Crow answers some of them in <u>this 6-minute video</u>, including why is sheet 71 following sheet 25? Are some of the pages missing? What

about military members? Where are the agricultural questionnaires that are noted? 80+ video comments, too.

I couldn't find myself (Sandy) right after April 1. My dad was in the Army and I knew we were living in the Territory of Hawaii. I didn't know the address, but I knew I learned to walk there. But, the OCR index couldn't find me, or even anything close to my surname. I was lucky that smaller record sets are being indexed first. Hawaii is finished now and I popped right up in a search. There is something satisfying about seeing yourself, sister and parents in the census. I was told 50 years later that life-long family friends lived across the street from us in Hawaii. I discovered it was true! There they were, except they weren't home. They were on sheet 80.

Commemorative Landscapes – capturing historical memory, a monumental visual history in North Carolina. This is a comprehensive digital collection of the state's monuments, shrines and public art. It has

stories of over 1,000 monuments across the state in 100 counties. <u>Click here for Commemorative Landscapes of</u> <u>North Carolina</u>, nicknamed *CommLand*. This collection has been added to <u>NCpedia</u>, too, which has over 8,400 articles about North Carolina. These are the types of websites that can help you add historical context to your stories about ancestors, who lived in North Carolina.

Oregon has some sites that are similar to the above sites in North Carolina. There is the <u>Oregon Encyclopedia</u>, which is a project of the Oregon Historical Society. The <u>Oregon Blue Book</u>, published by the Secretary of State since 1911, is a comprehensive almanac and fact book about Oregon. It has an extentive <u>Explore Oregon</u> section for discovering Oregon history. The Oregon Park and Rec Dept has an <u>Historic</u> <u>Cemetries Program</u>, which documents the state's pioneer cemeteries (<u>PDF list by county</u>). Deschutes Co. has 10 historic cemeteries. Do you have an ancestor buried in one of them? The State also has an <u>Oregon</u>

<u>Historic Sites Database</u>, which can be searched in many ways. In addition you can <u>view a state map</u> to find historic locations. <u>Deschutes County Historic Landmark Locations</u> is a map with local historic sites, which includes photos as well as more details about the sites, too. Lots of history to explore near home this summer. Ask Sue Dolezal about the Peter French Round Barn in Harney County!
