

# Al's News Agency



For those who have driven down North 2<sup>nd</sup> Street along the river heading to Albany, you probably have noticed a brown house overlooking the river. For years I thought that it seemed to be out of place. When I joined BCGS I got to know another member, David Utt, an interesting person with lots of information about Corvallis. One day he told me that his father and mother had owned a lunch counter that was on 2<sup>nd</sup> Street along the river. Suddenly, I knew why that "house" was there along the highway. This was his parents' lunch counter!

Sadly, David died August 9, 2021. I miss talking with him. He always came to our meetings with his son Lyle so I got to know him, too. Thanks to Lyle for giving me permission to use several photos for this story, and his uncle who has so many memories that he shared with me.

#### **HOW AL'S NEWS AGENCY BEGAN**

Archie Leroy "Al" Utt came to Corvallis in 1927 planning to continue on to Los Angeles. He took a road construction job in Corvallis and never made it to Los Angeles. In June 29, 1931, he married Alma Goff, whom he met at a boardinghouse where he ate his meals. He and Alma bought a home near Avery Park in 1940 and they lived there for the rest of their lives.

Here is what Lyle's uncle remembers:

"When my dad bought the business, Al's News Agency was located at 350 Monroe St., on the south side of the street next to the alley between  $3^{\rm rd}$  and  $4^{\rm th}$ . The space was leased from the Elks Club, which owned the building that occupied that corner, the southeast corner of  $4^{\rm th}$  and Monroe. The Club's front door was on  $4^{\rm th}$  Street."

#### Finding a New Place for Al's News Agency

"When the store's lease expired at the end of 1946, the Elks Club declined to renew it. My parents leased a lot on North Second Street from the owners of the service station next door and built a new building there, got new licenses and opened a new business with the same name. When I say "built" I don't just mean paid for – my father and some people he hired used the tools and constructed it. Some of the windows were Army surplus, because the Army was tearing down some of the barracks at Camp Adair.

My parents decided to retire when my mother turned 65, so that they could both collect Social Security. They didn't renew the licenses to operate the store for 1972, so they closed it at the end of 1971 and put the building up for sale."
