

VOLUNTEERS



I later visited the National Archives and this time I noted to search also "unindexed" records. Inagine my surprise and delight in being handed a large brown envelope containing many original documents of my ancestors. I wanted to share the magic word "unindexed" with those also searching for military records. I hope everyone has the good fortune to receive a first-hand glimpse into their own family history."

Bernice Robison-Charter member

I met Bernice Robison this week for the first time in her room at the Corvallis Manor. Right away I knew that we could have been friends for years if we could only have met.

But I must tell her story from the beginning. Bernice was born in Denver. Their family moved to Riverside when she was 4. She has one sister. She attended Jr. College and became a professional Girl Scout director. Her husband was a Boy Scout executive. They lived in Winslow, Az. for 20 years. They had two daughters.

She said she has always been interested in Genealogy. When she was a child she loved the family stories and when anyone in the family had information it was given to her.

It just seemed to be always understood that she would be the family historian. Others in the family did research and sent their information to her.

Bernice has three lines that go back to the Mayflower. COOK and WHITE are two of them. She belonged to the Nebraska Mayflower society and also to the D.A.R. of Riverside, Ca.

Most of her ancestory comes from England and Germany. There have been several books published on her different lines.

Some of her ancestors were Quakers and one of her stories is about a young man that followed his girlfriend to America and later married her but her family were very strict Quakers and would not let him come into the church for many years because he had been of the Episcopalian faith.

Bernice writes: "My grandfather Hughes Lamborn was an Elder in the South Denver Congregational Church when it joined with others to become a Community Church. He had been an Elder for years. In those days once an Elder, always an Elder, a so called "Hellder" He was given the two silver Communion Goblets for his many year's of service. They were passed from person to person, one on each side of the congergation. They were very plain silver ten or twelve inches high. I gave one to the Winslow Arizona Presbyterian Church for their Communion table. The other is in a Presbyterian Church on our Oregon Coast."

Another story: "In a small old oval tin frame I inherited a black rosette. Written beside it in fading ink; "Worn by Joseph Bunch in the Revolution". This came from a cousin of my mothers. Her mother was a Bunch. My mother's grandmother was a Bunch. I used this to be in the D.A.R. My grandson in Wisconsin now owns it along with all my records and books.

Bernice was a seamstress and made a lot of their clothes even tents, and sleeping bags. She hooked rugs, braided rugs and sketched the outline for the pictures her husband wanted to paint.


She has a beautiful cross stitched picture of birds on her wall that she sewed.


She has lived here in Corvallis since 1970. She became a member of the genealogy society and did lots of research at the old Richey room in the Library. She was put on the nominating committee one time and the Chairman announced that those on the committee would be the new officers - there was no vote and the chairman left town. Bernice was to be president, but she refused as she had only been in Corvallis a short time and didn't know many of the members. She said that was as close as she came to being an officer.

Bernice spends lots of time now with her hobby of Origami, folding paper into tiny birds, flowers, and other designs, gluing them on to note paper then drawing in the background. Her bureau has several drawers and she ask me to open the bottom drawer which she called her factory. The second drawer is her attic, and the third holds her supplies.

There was a box of finished note cards in her 'factory' drawer and she ask me to select three cards for my self.

Her philosophy - "When ever you go somewhere don't leave without some loot" These cards were my loot. They are very lovely. I hope she lets me visit again sometime.
