ANCESTRAL FILE

We have been talking about the CD-ROM that the LSD has attached to an SX 386 Computer at the FHC (Family History Center). They have now added the Ancestral File to the other programs available on CD-ROM. As of last Tuesday it was not in the FHC on Harrison yet. It should be here soon.

This file is a computer file of 7 million unique names linked into families and pedigrees. Information is displayed by individual, family group record, pedigree chart, or descendents chart. You can print these records on paper, or download the data to a diskette of your own.

The files contained in "Ancestral File" came from contributions from families and family organizations. Therefore, you can find the contributors names and addresses and correspond directly with them. You can add your own family information to Ancestral File by sending your information to the Family History Department. First, though, obtain the guide entitled Contributing to Ancestral File from the FHC on Harrison.

SOCIAL SECURITY FILES

On 31 Dec 1990 the FHC on Harrison received an update to the Family Search containing information on 49 Million Social Security Numbers of deceased SSA members. Talk to our President Dan if you want more information.

FEBRUARY MEETING

DOWER RIGHTS


A DOWER is the part of a man's property that his widow will inherit for life. If there were children, the wife was entitled to a child's share of her husband's property but not less then 1/5 of the property. The evidence of dower rights is often seen in deeds, when the wife is asked to sign separately that she consented to her husband's sale of land. In counties where marriage records are sparsely recorded or lost and before the 1850 census when the wife and children were name, the release of dower rights by the wife may be your first clue to the name of some great-grandmother.

CENSUS

White persons who married Indians were NOT listed on the federal census records if the event took place in Oklahoma, Arkansas, or Missouri before 1880, because these persons were considered as part of the Indian Nation they married into. The National Archives has applications to court of claims. Beginning in 1906, all Indians had to fill out a claim. The claims asked for children, parents, grandparents, birth and death dates, places of residence and birth, and both English and Indian names.
