



DREAM BARS

1/2 cup butter or shortening 1/2 cup brown sugar

1/2 tsp. salt

1 cup flour

Mix above ingredients to a crumbly mass and pat into a shallow baking pan 9X13 and bake in 350 degree oven for 10 minutes. Cool a little, then spread with the following;

1 cup brown sugar

2 eggs

1 tsp. vanilla

2 tbsp. flour

1 tsp. baking powder

1/2 tsp. salt

1 cup chocolate chips

Bake 20 minutes at 375 degrees. Cool slightly and cut into bars.

- Third daughter for the mother.

CALIFORNIA RESEARCH

The following information is from the Oregonian, 16 December 1991, and was given to me by Mabelle Martching. Although this information is two years old, and the prices have undoubtedly



changed, it should be of interest to some members.

"Searches for birth certificates and marriage certificates cost \$12 and cover a 10 year period. Death certificate searches cost \$8, also for a 10 year period.

It's important to include with payment as much information as possible that's pertinent to the request. Examples would be father's name or mother's maiden name, county of death, birth or marriage. Even a social security number - if known - can help.

All requests to: State Registrar, 304 S. St., Sacramento, CA 95814. Make checks out to Vital Records."

There was also an answer, in a Dear Abby column, from The Office of Vital Statistics for Florida on this subject. If you need to know where to look, use the **Handibook for Genealogists** in our library. Be sure to check the date and get the newest one.
