OREGON'S COVERED BRIDGES

OREGON has the largest collection of covered bridges in the West and one of the largest in the nation. The tradition of covered bridges in Oregon dates from the 1850's. Uncovered wooden bridges were found to last about 20 years and some bridges would start to have problems earlier. A covered bridge could last for 80-100 years or better so they soon became popular.

Early owners of covered bridges charged tolls to finance construction: 3 cents for a sheep, 5 cents for a horse and rider. Douglas fir was abundant so in western Oregon, many bridges were made of that. It continued especially during the two world wars because of the shortage of steel, and continued into the 1950's.

Between 1905 and 1925, Oregon had 600 covered bridges. Today Oregon has 51. In 1987, legislation was written to fund preservation of this wonderful part of Oregon's story. We're glad to have three of the 51.

Covered Bridges in Benton County

Harris Covered Bridge Mary's River

From Corvallis, take Hwy
20 through Philomath to
Wren, Exit Hwy 20 at Kings
Valley junction, turn into
Wren to Harris Rd, Travel
west on Harris Rd
approximately 2.5 miles.

Hayden Covered Bridge Alsea River

From Corvallis, go through Philomath on Hwy 20, turn left on Hwy 34 to Alsea. Hayden is located on Hayden Co. Rd., 1.5 miles west of Alsea, Just off of Hwy 34.



Irish Bend Covered Bridge Oak Creek

In Corvallis, travel west on Harrison Blvd to 53rd St.

Follow 53rd to Benton

County Fair Grounds. Park at the fair grounds and follow the footpath across the street from the fairgrounds (Campus Way) east.



Harris Bridge

Harris Bridge was constructed either about 1929 or 1936. It replaced a covered bridge at the same site.

Irish Bend Bridge

Irish Bend Bridge was built to be a regular bridge in the 1920's. In 1954 it was made into a covered bridge. It has an interesting background of being moved around more than once and left to fall apart in other times.

<u>Hayden</u>
