

SOCIETY BY-LAWS

- **ARTICLE 1** The name of this organization shall be the Benton County Society.
- ARTICLE 11 The Society is non-profit, non-sectarian, and non-political.
- ARTICLE 111 1. To assist each other in genealogical research through association, Inspiration, and mutual exchange and interaction.
 - 2. To encourage and provide for genealogical research.
 - 3. To cooperate with the Corvallis-Benton County Public Library and the Benton County Historical Society in matters pertaining to genealogical research.
 - 4. Country Historical Society in matters pertaining to genealogical research.
 - 5. To advocate for accurate research and careful documentation.
 - 6. To encourage the study of family history through mutual support and the exchange of information.
 - 7. To accumulate resource materials for the Society library.
 - 8. To assist in the preservation and publication of local history.

This is a booklet from 1984 explaining what the Society was about. At this time the Society's name was **Mid-Valley Genealogical Society**. We still use a booklet very much like 1984 for new members.

CORVALLIS NEWSPAPERS BEFORE THE CIVIL WAR

The Occidental Messenger was started in June, 1857, at Corvallis. It was financed by J.C. Avery, the founder of Corvallis. T. B. Odeneal was the editor for a while. The Messenger was the avowed advocate of slavery in the West as in the South.

Another pro-slavery publication in Corvallis was the **Frontier Sentinel**, whose editor declared that it was published "to give an ardent and unwavering support to the introduction of slavery in Oregon." L.P. Hall was its publisher.

The Democratic Crisis issued its first number on February 2, 1859. T.B. Odeneal was the editor. Before long he found a crisis in his own financial affairs and traded the paper to J.H. Slater for to J.H. Slater for his store-----

whereupon Mr. Slater changed the name of the paper to the **Oregon Weekly Union** and came out as a strong advocate of Breckenridge and Lane for president and vice-president. After Fort Sumter had been fired upon, the union upheld the side of the south. It was suppressed by the government in 1863.

Benton County Museum

In the late 1850's in Benton County, some people began to see each other as Northerners and Southerners instead of friends. When it looked like Abraham Lincoln was going to win the election, both sides went to "war."

The Historical Records Survey for Benton County by Mark Phinney interviewed in 1938 Mrs. Josephine Wells:

"There was another family of Williams in Polk County who were Democrats."

On one occasion the two sons drove a team through Corvallis, shouting "Hurrah for Jeff Davis" while the mother sat on the rear seat with a loaded revolver in each hand covering both sides of the street. The woman was reputed to be a good marksman and no one interfered."
