

Land claims reflect life in Corvallis' early days

On behalf of themselves and their wives, five men filed Provisional claims to land in the Corvallis area in the 1845-1847 period: Joseph C. Avery, Johnson Mulkey, William F. Dixon, John Stewart and Joseph P. Friedley.

Oregon became a U.S. Territory in 1848, and the provisional government turned its records





over to the federal government. Other settlers staked out claims between and surrounding original the ones. The surveyor general, the administrator provided for in the

federal donation land law of 1850, approved previous claims that met provisions of the law and accepted new ones until April 1855.

On the bluff north of the mouth of Marys River, Avery laid out 24 blocks of a town he named Marysville. He gave the streets parallel to the river numbers: First, Second, Third, Fourth. The streets in the other direction he named for U.S. Presidents in order: Washington, Adams, Madison, Monroe, Jackson.

Dixon's claim along the Willamette River joined Avery's on the north. He liked the idea of the new town and designated six blocks of his river front as an

addition to Marysville. The new streets extended the numbered ones and added Van Buren and Harrison streets.

As the town spread westward, additions continued the same pattern, until they reached Dixon's west line, which ran north and

south instead of being parallel to the river.

Sol King and his wife Maria moved into town from Wren. He operated a livery stable and served five terms as sheriff of Benton County. They built their home and barns on high ground northwest of the town. The road out toward their place followed the west line of Dixon's claim and became known as Kings Road (now Kings Boulevard).

Dixon's north boundary became Grant Street (now Grant Avenue), and other new streets were sometimes laid out along land-claim lines. In that way the land for the rights-of-way came

equally owners.

The northern boundary of Avery's claim runs along the center of Jefferson Way between 11th Street and the Memorial Union corner. His west boundary has become 26th Street south to Brook Lane.

The western section of Grant Avenue was the dividing line between the James L. Mulkey and Joseph P. Friedley claims. The Friedley home, gardens and orchards were on the corner of Kings Boulevard and Monroe Avenue.

When I was a young man, I met a Friedley son who was well along in his years and partially crippled. He told me that after his father and mother died, the sons and daughters sold off pieces of the property as they needed funds for living expenses or investment. He and one of his brothers wanted to be cowboys; they sold their share and went off to Eastern Oregon.

Other sons of the pioneers used their inheritance in various ways.

At least two of the children of J.C. and Martha Avery subdivided their property as home sites. Frances Avery Helm, the first postmistress in Corvallis, built the Queen Anne house that still stands at the south end of Fifth Street. Other heirs sold or donated land for what are now Pioneer and Avery parks.

The claim of Frederick A. and Mary J. Horning lies along the west side of 35th Street between Harrison Avenue and Western Boulevard. Their daughter married William Groves, who became a partner in a wool-carding mill that used water power from Oak Creek. Grandson Frank Groves maintained a model orchard and farmstead.

Jess Hanson and his wife Lora bought part of the Horning property and there developed a world-renowned strain of White Legorn egg-layers. Their hatchery shipped day-old chicks by parcel post. The family home is now the Hanson Country Inn. The southern part of the Alfred and Drusilla Witham claim is now in fields and barns of the Agricultural Experiment Station. Three Witham sons built homes on the ancestral estate at sites that can be identified, but no one lives there now.

All three Corvallis residents share the same interest.d digging into their personal past to find out who their ancestors were, where they came from and how they lived.

They are hooked on genealogy, one of the fastest-growing hobbies in the United States.

According to the National Genealogical Society, digging for family roots is now the third most popular hobby in the nation, behind stamp and coin collecting. All three Corvallis residents say they can easily understand the appeal. stand the appeal.

"It's just like being a detective and having a mystery to solve," Carter said. "It's just a fun thing to do. You meet a lot of other people working out the same conundrums, the same mysteries. It's highly exciting once you

get involved and start finding things."

"I had no idea my family had pioneer ancestors who came over on the Oregon Trail," said Froehlich. "We've been meeting relatives from all over the States. You never know what you will run into.

Carter has been researching her past for about 10 years. She is a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution, thanks to one Rufus Bassett, an ancestor who joined the army in Maine to help the colonies gain independence.

But her research has taken her back even farther. Her earliest American ancestor was William Bassett, who arrived in North America in 1621 on the ship Fortune, the vessel that followed the Mayflower to the New World. Carter discovered that William Bassett married into the family of William Brewster, one of the Mayflow-er passengers. That makes her eligible for membership

in the Mayflower Society, a group she may join. Grube's search took her even further back. She can trace one line of her family back to the Emperor Charlemagne, who was born in 742 and was one of the greatest military leaders of the Middle Ages. Another line of her family includes Princess Diana of Great Britain.

Not everyone on her family tree is so illustrious, however. One ancestor immigrated to Oregon in the 1800s and went to prison for shooting a man he suspected of

fooling around with his wife.
"He must have been a hot-headed fellow," Grube said with a smile.

Froehlich, president of the Corvallis-based Mid-Valley Genealogical Society, started his search about nine years ago when his wife died, leaving him with an infant son. le wanted to tell his son where his ancestors came from. The search took him to documented relations in England in 1530. He has undocumented evidence of relatives dat-

ing back to the 1000s, "but I'm kind of skeptical of

Tracing your family roots back to ancient kings may seem like a daunting task, but Froehlich, Carter and Grube all said it's not that difficult. Records and clues abound.

"It's no big deal. Anyone can do it," Grube said.

The first step is to start with your immediate family, such as mothers and fathers, grandparents and aunts and uncles. Collect the names, birthdates, dates of death and as much other information as those people can provide on your immediate ancestors. Then log that information on a family tree or a family chart.

Those names can be used as a starting point in a search for records that will provide further clues. Census information, cemetery records, family Bibles, library materials, military records and government archives can all yield valuable information.






Meeting in Methodist Church at 10 am, program at 11 am.



Christmastime flood

Our December 1999 Newsletter tells about the terrible flood in the Willamette Valley in 1861-1862 which has not been equaled since. It began on Sunday, December 29, 1861. At its height, there was said to be four feet of water over the entire valley floor. By the time it began to subside on the first Sunday in January, 1862, much livestock had been drowned and fences houses and barns had been swept away in tragic numbers. The Wiley Winkle family lived on the butte which is about 6 miles south of Corvallis. All they could see in any direction was water and the floating corpses of dead animals and the wreckage of buildings washing up on the butte. According to local folklore, Mrs. Winkle wanted her husband to go down and stick his finger in the water and taste it for she thought it must surely be the ocean coming inland.
